## Call for County Convention

The electors of the republican party of Custer county, Nebraska, are hereby requested to elect delegates from their townships to meet in delegation at Broken Bow, Nebraska, Saturday, August 10, 1901, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of electing delegates to the State convention to be held at August 28, 1901, and also purpose of placing in nomination full county ticket to be voted the general election in November 1901, as follows:

County Treasurer, County Judge, Sheriff, Superintendent of Public Instruction, of Deeds, County Surveyor, Coroner, and to transact business as may come before convention.

The basis of representation be one delegate for every five or major fraction of electors for Hon. E. Royse, county clerk, and one elector in each township, which gives the delegation by townships:
