FACTS ABOUT ARMIES.

Alexander's Large Phalanx Known as a Tetra-Phalangarchy.

Until the time of Charles XII. of Sweden the artillery was not considered a part of the army; the men serving in it were not soldiers, but regarded as mechanics; the officers had no rank and regularly organized the artillery into companies. The battle of Pavia demonstrated the superiority of the gun in the hands of the Spanish infantry. The musket carried a two ounce ball, and sometimes brought down at one fire two or three mailed knights. The French sent a flag of truce to remonstrate against the use of such barbarous weapons. Alexander, says Pearson's Weekly, had four kinds of cavalry—the cataphracti, or heavy armed horse; the light cavalry, carrying spears and very light armour; the acrobolites, or mounted archers, used for outposts, patrols and reconnoitering duty; and the dimachoe, or troops expected to act either as cavalry or infantry. Alexander the great reorganized his father's army. The file of lachos of sixteen men was the unit; two files made a diloch; two diloches made a tetrach; two tetrachs a hexach; two of these a syntagma; sixteen of these a small phalanx; four of them a tetra phalangarchy, otherwise known as a large phalanx. The Greeks attacked in a phalanx, the spear interlocked and shields overlapping. After the first onset the spears were dropped and the day was decided with the sword. The cavalry attacked the enemy in the rear, if possible, and, in case of victory, undertook the pursuit.

National Transmitting Clock.

The transmitting clock at the naval observatory, Washington, is the absolute monarch of American timekeepers. Every day in the year except Sunday, by one pendulum-stroke, it speaks directly and instantaneously to every city and considerable town between the peaks of the Rockies and the pines of Maine at high noon. By this one clock at the national capital (together with its duplicate on the Pacific), is set nearly every timepiece in the United States and Cuba, most of those in Mexico and many on the border of Canada. A number of clocks—from three to 5,000—in nearly every city and large town are wired together into a local family, and, by means of a switch-key at the telegraph office, are put into direct contact with the parent clock at the national capital. So that the instant the electric touch is given from Washington every clock in the circuit—whether it be at Boston, Minneapolis, or New Orleans—begins a new day in perfect accord with its mechanical deity.

Favored Calve.

Mlle. Calve, the famous prima donna, was once on a tour when two Spaniards stole a pocketbook from her. In it were many luck pieces and tall-mans, and their loss worried the singer greatly. When the newspapers reported the theft the polite thieves sent her the relics neatly inclosed in a bag, and with this a courteous note requesting that they, as finders of the treasures, might be allowed to keep the money that happened to be in the pocketbook as a souvenir of so great a singer.

Colonel Cochran's Record.

Colonel Henry Clay Cochran, who has been ordered from his post at the Boston navy yard to the command of the marine forces in China, is a Pennsylvanian by birth. He has seen thirty-eight years' service in the corps, and is one of the veterans in the service. He received his appointment in the early part of the civil war, and participated in the battle of Mobile bay and other engagements.

Cinders Carried Fifty-Miles.

Cinders from the forest fires on Cape Cod were carried by the wind as far as Boston, a distance of almost fifty miles, falling in the streets and the waters of the harbor in considerable showers.

Ants Dislike Cayenne Pepper.

Cayenne pepper is the best thing that can be used to destroy red ants. Spread it on the shelves in the pantry and the ants will soon disappear.

Shrill Tones at High Altitudes.

Races living at high altitudes have weaker and more highly pitched voices than those living in regions where the supply of oxygen is more plentiful. Thus, in America, among the Indians living on the plateaus, between the ranges of the Andes, at an elevation of from 10,000 feet to 14,000 feet, the men have voices like the women, and women like children, and their singing a shrill monotone.

SUPERPOSED LAYERS.

Sword of a Thousand Pieces Made by Japanese.

What do you think of a sword blade that contains a thousand sheets of metal? Yet they are not uncommon, and as you will readily imagine, are of Oriental workmanship. Our painstaking, patient Japanese friends are the makers of them. The blades of these sabers are made from magnetic iron ores. The steel is produced in small, very thin sheets, and the workman begins by fixing one of them to the end of an iron rod, which serves as a handle. To this are soldered other small sheets, until the mass has a length of about eight inches, a width of about two inches and a thickness of a little more than a quarter of an inch. This bar is brought to a white heat, doubled on itself, and hammered until it is down to its original dimensions. This process is repeated fifteen times. Four similar bars are then soldered together, doubled upon themselves, resoldered and heated, the operation being repeated five times. This process makes the superposed layers so thin that a saber contains at least a thousand sheets of metal. If you find one of these swords that has a veined appearance you may know it is caused by alternate layers of iron and steel being soldered together.

War Benefits English Capitalists.

Owing, perhaps to the war, there has been a considerable falling off in the sales of land and property at the London Auction Mart in 1900, the totals showing only £4,934,769, as compared with £6,290,314 last year. One of the biggest properties sold was the Cavendish estates of 2,110 acres, in the Staffordshire and Buckinghamshire, which went for £100,000.
