Goold, Republican nomince for regent of the State university, was one those who had borrowed money of Treasurer Batley and had not paid it back. The amount claimed to have been thus borrowed was set down as \$1000. The True Situation.

"Close Observer" in the Chief last week, makes the assertion that the seven mill levy of 1900 was used to meet the expenses of 1900 and that the republican board is not entitled to the credit of keeping the expenses of 1901 within the

bounds of the receipts. Now, let us see, it was December 1900, when the pop beard cut the 14 mill levy, made in June of tha year, to seven mills. The tax o 1900 became due and payable January, 1901, and delinquent February and May, 1901. The tax of 1900 was not completed and put or the tax books until after January 1st, 1901, when the time of the majority of the pop members o the board had expired. Not a cent of the tax was collected until after January, 1961. While it is true that warrants are drawn on the levy in anticipation of the tax, the facts are that the pop board exceeded the levy of 1900 nearly twenty thousand dollars, and was compelled to provide for the shortage by transferring funds from other levies to replenish the sink funds or hands for other purposes which they had been compelled to use Had it not been for Frank Young coming to their rescue in buying up nearly \$40,000 of delinquent taxes on real estate, the county finances would have been in a most deplorable condition. Even with that large sum of money, it was but very short time until it was practically gone, it was like pouring

water in a rat hole. The republican board, when it came into power the first of January, had but little, comparatively spesking, but the delinquent tax list that the pop board had been unable to collect and the revenue to be derived from a seven mill levy to meet the current expenses of the year. Realizing the situation and knowing the attempt of the outgoing board to embarrass them, they determined on making the best of the situation possible, All know the result. The republican board has proven equal for the task. By economy and good judgment it has kept the expenses within the receipts, and will close the year out of debt. Continue the republican power by voting for republican candidates, and thus keep down extravagence and the misappropriation of the county's finances.
