LETTER FROM JULIUS OTTUM.

Brooklyn, Minn., Nov. 23, 1901.

—Dear Editor:—Your valuable paper comes to us every Sunday as a letter from friends at home, very dear to us. It comes on the west bound train, so it must come by the way of Chicago, but nevertheless, it is welcome when it arrives. We have had a very fine fall here. This morning the ground was covered with snow but at noon it was all gone. The work in the woods has been going on for some time; the wages are from \$28 to \$65 a month, but the camps are getting filled up fast. They are waiting for snow, so they can start to hauling lumber. There will be about two and one-half million feet hauled to this town this winter, besides all the staves and bolts that will be brought in. Maple wood is worth \$1.25 in 16 inch length wood. It costs about \$30.00 to buy wood enough for one winter here. They say the crop this year was very small, scarcely half crop. Stock is very cheap here; about two cents per pound. Hogs range about sixty cents on the hundred less than the market at Broken Bow or \$1.10 less than at St. Paul, but there is a big shrinkage in the hogs that is fattened on pumpkins and squashes. There is quite an exchange in real estate here; some get dissatisfied and want to go and find a paradise, and others come in and take their place. Here land is selling from \$5 to \$20 per acre, according to improvements on the place and value of timber on it. As a rule, it is a better class of farmers moving in and that helps to improve the country. We intend to

form a stock company in the spring and build a flour mill here. We have three feed mills now, but there is a great opening for a flour mill. The hotel that burned down the night of the 4th of July, is now rebuilt and running in full blast, and is a hotel that would be a credit to a much larger town than this.

An effort will be made to arrange for all members of the society to secure their trees and plants of one nursery company and thus secure good stock at low prices, and perhaps save something in the line of boxes and freight.

The state horticultural society has put out some very valuable reports. A supply of these have been ordered for distribution at this meeting.

Everyone having fruit grown in the county are requested to bring specimens of each variety, whether they are considered good quality or not. We want to see what fruit has been grown in the county and learn something of the conditions under which it was grown, and if possible, learn some of the causes of so many failures. Everybody interested cordially invited to attend.

The Agricultural Society Election.

The Custer County Agricultural Society, at its annual meeting elected J. J. Wilson, president; Ed. House, secretary; Alpha Morgan, treasurer; and Tom Finlen, vice-president. G. R. Russom, J. O. Faroy Box Stationery at Ed McComas's.

Taylor and S. K. Haines were elected directors. The receipts of the society amounted to \$1,950, which is enough to pay all premiums and current expenses with a balance of \$100, besides the \$400 tied up in the failure of the Farmers Bank. The officers are to be congratulated on the financial success attained considering the unfavorable conditions of the crops for a successful exhibit. But as the indebtedness against the grounds which now amounts to nearly \$1400, and is now due, the new officers has a burlesque task before them. We anticipate, however, that they will prove equal to the emergency, and with the money due from the county and the bank, will with next year's receipts be able to save the property and put the society out of debt. The debt was contracted several years ago when the land was bought and improvements made, when J. L. H. Knight was secretary.
