Public sentiment will at least heartily endorse that part of Mr. Roosevelt's statement in which he admonishes all the disputants to drop the matter and give the country a rest.

Has Mr. Bryan noticed the violation of the "consent of the governed" right, in the recent order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, providing that Indians shall keep their hair cut?

It was characteristically level headed of Mr. Roosevelt to withdraw his name from the list of officers recommended for brevet rank, before sending it to Congress. The recommendations of the Army Brevet Board conferred upon the President, in connection with his Spanish war service the ranks of colonel and brigadier general.

It is hard to cast out of our minds the impression that the gentlemen in the Congress who are now predicting such dire results from our occupancy and administration of the Philippines are the same gentlemen who only a few years ago were prophesying that unless we adopted their free silver program the country would be one vast wreck.

While the Washington Post believes that the Democrats will not dare adopt an actual "scuttle Philippine policy" blank in their platform, it says that if they do perpetrate such a blunder, they will create a logical demand for Col. William Jennings Bryan to lead his party to a third successive defeat at the polls, which opportunity Mr. Bryan will most eagerly seize.

The recent order of the new postmaster general to the effect that no fourth-class postmasters will be removed except for cause will come as unpleasant surprise to some Congressmen and politicians, but will be viewed with satisfaction by those who desire only good service. The policy seems to be in direct accord with the President's views as to the merit system in Federal service.

When Senator Carmack denounced in the Senate the Philippines Commission's "treason" law as most "tyrannical and un-American," Senator Foraker explained that the severest clause in the Philippines treason and sedition law was copied from the

statutes of the state of Tennessee. This was unfeeling in the Ohio Senator in view of the fact that Mr. Carmack is a Senator from Tennessee.

The anniversary of the birthday of Samuel J. Tilden was made the occasion of a great Democratic banquet in Brooklyn, in the hopes of solidifying and strengthening the party. It is noticed, however, that the most prominent men of both factions were conspicuously absent. The "peerless leader" of 1896-1900 sent a short note and an editorial of advice from the Commoner, and ex-President Cleveland sent also a long letter full of counsel. Ex-Governor Hill, of New York, like wise found it inconvenient to attend. Were Samuel Randall alive he would be forced to the permanent conclusion that the wings of Democracy no longer "flap together."

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

Article 1.
The name of said corporation shall be Central Telephone Company.
Article 2.
The principal place of transacting its business shall be in the city of Broken Bow, Nebraska.
Article 3.
The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be the erecting and maintaining of poles, wires, switches, telephones and all other apparatus necessary for the operation of a telephone system in such poles and wires within said state as the public interests and business may require and to build, erect, purchase, lease and operate all such additional lines and to such them as the interests of the corporation justly, and to carry out said purpose said corporation is empowered to take and to contract for and enter such buildings, thereon as the interests of the company may require.
Article 4.
The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be divided into seven hundred and fifty shares of \$100 each, to be subscribed and paid for at or before the date of the organization of said corporation. The remaining three hundred and fifty shares shall be held in the name of said corporation to be sold and disposed of only for a cashing, leasing and extending the line and to the satisfaction of the corporation. The stock shall not be divided or sold until the same is sold and paid for by the officers of said corporation, and that stock sold shall be at par value.
Article 5.
The existence of this corporation shall continue on the 31st day of March, 1902, and until dissolved by the directors.
Article 6.
The business of said corporation shall be conducted by a board of directors composed of five members, who shall be elected by the stockholders of said corporation from among their number by the vote of a majority of the stockholders to be held by the Board of Directors. No stockholder shall have any vote in the election of directors until the same is sold and paid for by the officers of said corporation, and that stock sold shall be at par value.
Article 7.
The officers of said corporation shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer and a general manager. All officers of the corporation shall be elected by the Board of Directors. No stockholder shall have any vote in the election of any or more of said officers.
Article 8.
The highest indebtedness to which said corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock.
Article 9.
The meetings of said Board of Directors and the methods of conducting the business of said corporation shall be governed by the laws of the state of Nebraska.
