The City Election.

The city election passed off quietly. Notwithstanding that the weather was exceptionally fine, a light vote was cast. There were but 280 votes cast, where there were 316 last year. There being but one ticket in the field for city officers, but little interest was taken in the election, except upon the question of saloon license. We noticed, as the votes

were being canvassed, that a number of ballots were blank, except upon the question of license. There were a number of ballots that were voted, for part or all of the candidates, and were silent on the question of license. On the question of saloon license we append the following table, giving the vote last year and this year, in each of the wards:

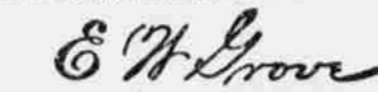
