

one of the special features. In fact the treatment for diseases of all animals is taught. Among the important discoveries the experimental station has developed in the past few months is a sure preventative of hog cholera and the cause of the corn stalk disease in horses.

The department is greatly hampered for room and could do much better work had they better facilities, but are doing splendid work for the advantages they have.

Peacefully at Rest.

Now Ann Gitt, wife of Rev. Richard Gitt, was born May 13th, 1853, in Johnson County, Indiana; died April 28th, 1902, in Custer County, Nebraska, aged 48 years, 11 months and 16 days, having been afflicted with nervous trouble for about eight years.

In all these years her afflictions were very severe, yet she bore them with a wonderful degree of patience, characteristic of her noble Christian life. She was never known to murmur or complain. The deceased was ever ready to sacrifice for the good of others. Her kind, sympathizing heart was always ready to extend a helping hand and give a sheltering home to God's dependent, motherless little ones of earth, of whom she assumed the care and shared the responsibility of many of these during the greater part of her life. Many of these will ever hold in loving remembrance sweet thoughts of this good woman. We speak from a personal knowledge, the writer having known the deceased for nearly thirty years. At times her suffering was very intense.

She and her husband were members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, having been associated with that denomination since early in their married life. She was a earnest, a tireless worker in the church, and elsewhere, wherever duty called, until the hand of affliction was laid so heavily upon her, and even then after her life was robbed of its larger activities in Christian work, that sweet spirit of patience and kind heartedness told to all those who were permitted to have the pleasure of her association during these years of affliction, that the love of Christ is sufficient to give comfort and soothing peace in the hour of affliction.

Deceased was the mother of eight children, three having died in infancy. She leaves a husband and five children, three boys and two girls, one sister and one brother in Nebraska, and other relatives in the east, to mourn the loss of a tender, loving, Christian mother; a true, affectionate, faithful wife; and good and kind sister.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. E. Myers of the U. B. Church, at the Custer Center Sod Church. The funeral was largely attended by neighbors and sympathizing friends. Her body was laid to rest in that silent home among the sleeping dead in Custer Center Cemetery. But that sweet spirit has been transplanted in that happy Eden of love, far removed beyond where the pang of suffering, sorrow and bitter disappointment will be known; where sweet peace, harmony, and love will forever prevail. How precious the thought to know her life is hid with Christ in God.

Her death was a great shock to her own family and the entire community, having culminated so suddenly in paralysis of the entire nervous system. The family were all present during her last moments and watched with aching hearts the Angel of Death kiss her eyelids still in that dreamless sleep which marks the abode between the two great eternities. She peacefully fell

asleep without a struggle, to wake up in the paradise of God. This dear family have the sympathy of the entire community in this sad bereavement.

Death is only a dream, We'll wake up beyond the dark stream. How peaceful the slumber! how happy the waking! For death is only a dream.
