On motion, the report of the auditing committee was accepted and the original ordered filed.

On motion of Sullivan, seconded by Warrick, that it be the sense of this association that the erection of field vats is demanded for the public good, and that the executive committee be instructed to act at once for the association in arrangements for the erection of vats at points designated-Broken Bow, Anselmo, South Loup, Middle Loup, and also at Dunning.
