Congressman Hepburn was moved to attack it as merely a scheme to fasten an expenditure of \$750,000,000 on the national Treasury, but we predict that long before a third of that amount has been disbursed for irrigation he and dozens of his sympathizers will have come to recognize their mistake in opposing it.

THE ISLAND OF GUAM

BY H. H. HIATT.

Agana, Island of Guam, April 12, 1902.—REPUBLICAN—Perhaps there is nothing we miss more than the beautiful twilight of the temperate zone. Here day and night come on so suddenly that we lose the restful sense so noticeable in longer twilight there. With our still air and damp atmosphere the sun seems to rush out of the ocean with a suddenness and heat that makes the morning very like MIDDAY. We do not have that gradual change which makes the summer days so beautiful in your latitude. Summer here begins with December and continues till June, then the winter sets in and lasts till December. This distinction of seasons is made on account of the moisture, and not temperature. The summer is the dry season and winter is the wet season. It has been almost impossible to know much about any thing here from the natives, and the Americans have been so transient that they knew but little of the local conditions. May is evidently the driest month and also the hottest. The thermometer will no doubt register hot weather in June, July, August and September but the rains and cloudy weather moderate the climate very much. The Typhoons occur during June till December, although this period is usually the most quiet. With December comes pleasant breezes and sometimes moderate gales. Severe typhoons strike this island about once in 40 years if the reports are reliable. The typhoon which visited this island in 1900, was very severe and its effects are very visible. In fact fruit trees have not yet recovered. It was this typhoon that blew the "Yosemite" out of the harbor here and left it to sink in the Ocean north of this island. The "Justin" was also in the harbor at the time, but its anchor held and was saved. It was the "Justin" that took the men off the Yosemite before it went down. After this typhoon of November 1900, there was nothing green left on the island, for the salt water was blown over it so that everything not killed by the wind was destroyed by the salt. All the native houses were unroofed and but few left standing. The house in which we live was then occupied by Mr. Pressey and other naval officers, and the ocean rose till it covered most of this city and was two feet deep around this house. All the houses with sheet iron roofs were uncovered. This house was very little damaged in any way because of its heavy tile roof, laid in cement. These tile roofs give us a feeling of security against storms, but they make us nervous when earthquakes set them to grinding. The Nipa (Neepa) roofs of native houses are made of Cocoa-Nut tree leaves and are very good, but last only about 3 years. If we had such windy weather as is common in Nebraska, these roofs would be torn off every month.

USE OF DISTILLED OR UNCOLORED VINEGAR

believing it to be unwholesome. Such is not the case and in order that consumers may properly understand this matter, the following statement in regard to vinegars is published for the benefit of the people of the state. As authority for this statement in regard to vinegar and its essential part, acetic acid, the food commission refers by permission to H. H. Nicholson, professor of chemistry, state university, and J. M. Nelson, chemist for food commission.

VINEGAR

All vinegar results from the acetic fermentation of alcoholic liquids. The essential part of any vinegar is the acetic acid which it contains. The acetic acid comes from the fermentation of the alcohol. Alcohol is the same whether it comes from grain or fruit, corn or apple, and when subjected to the same kind of fermentation it will change into the same acetic acid. Therefore the acetic acid of a distilled vinegar is the same as the acetic acid of a cider or malt vinegar and for practical and domestic purposes distilled vinegar is just as good as cider or malt vinegar.

DISTILLED VINEGAR

Distilled, or white wine, vinegar is obtained by distilling off the alcohol from the fermented wort from grains such as corn and rye. This kind of vinegar is colorless, and contains no substances injurious to health.

CIDER VINEGAR

Cider vinegar is derived from the juice of apples by allowing the sugar and starch of the apple to change into alcohol and subjecting it to acetic fermentation. Cider vinegar has a color varying from pale yellow to a deep red.

MALT VINEGAR

Malt vinegar is made from acetic fermentation of wort from barley, corn and rye. It differs from distilled vinegar in that the alcohol is not distilled off before it is changed into acetic acid. This vinegar has a color varying from red to brown, and a peculiar malt-like odor.

With the understanding that the Hon. F. M. Currie is a candidate for the position of congressman from this congressional district, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we recognize in Mr. Currie his eminent fitness for the place; and as a mark of our confidence, we do hereby authorize him to name the delegation to represent his interest in the congressional convention.
