Fertilizing the Strawberry.

From a careful study of the anatomy of the strawberry plant the Wisconsin station is of the opinion that a liberal top dressing with the manure or a very fertile soil after the fruiting season is the most rational method of fertilizing the strawberry plantation. This dressing protects the crowns of the plants from excessive summer heat and furnishes the young roots with abundant nourishment throughout the growing season, developing strong plants which are able to store up in the short stems a good supply of reserve material for the first leaf growth the following spring.

Quality of Eggs.

We often hear people say that eggs from some breeds of fowls are richer than those from others, and that those with dark shells are richer than those with white shells. Such differences, or, rather, the source of such differences is purely imaginary. Neither the breed nor the color of the shell affect the quality of the egg. It is the food, and that alone, which affects the flavor and delicate quality of the egg. If hens are carefully fed on wholesome foods, they will remain healthy, and their eggs will be very different from those laid by poorly conditioned hens.

Hay Crop Substitute.

There is always an excellent substitute for clover and timothy when the hay crop is short, and that is millet. It is a quick-growing summer crop that may be sown in May or June, and it seldom fails to produce a large yield of hay. It is also one of the best indicators of weeds that can be used, and it grows so rapidly as to crowd the weeds to destruction. A crop of Hungarian grass may also be sown down for a summer yield of hay, as it may

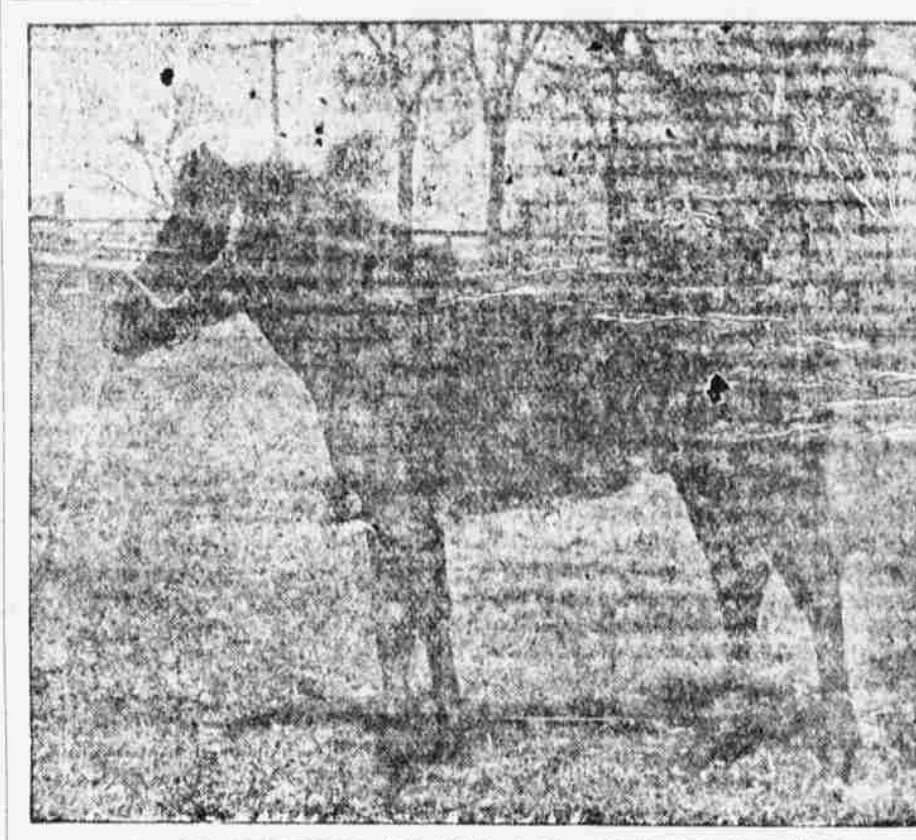
be mowed three or four times during the season, being also, like millet, a weed destroyer.

Chance for Eastern Farmers.

The high price of cattle is leading many of our New England farmers to raise their calves and to use more steers and oxen on the farm, and, in fact, to be in line to have more cattle to sell you by year. This is a healthy sign for New England agriculture, as nothing seems to be such clear gain as turning off a pair or two of fat cattle every year. Cattle raising has been too much neglected in the New England States during the past twenty years and it is a pleasure to note that on many farms cattle husbandry is again coming to the front. No better beef in the world is raised than that which is pastured on New England hillsides even if it topped off with Western corn though we believe that cattle has better fodder and corn to be harvested in the grain. Nothing seems to improve the farm faster than increased attention to the producing of beef and raising the necessary fodder crops and grain crops.—Morris Insetts Ploverman.

Colt Inherits Speed.

The colt Gerald McKinnie is the property of Wm. M. McKinnie of Fort Wayne, Ind., and without doubt in herds extreme speed. A glance at his

picture can but convince one of his wonderful development of bone and muscle. His sire is the great Crescens, with a trotting record of 2:02 1/4, who is rich in the best blood of American trotters. He holds six world's wagon and harness records on mile and half mile tracks, and it is predicted by those who are judges that he will go a mile in two minutes flat. Mr. Ketchum, of Toledo, the owner of Crescens, trains and drives his own horse. The dam of Gerald McKinnie (Mary Centlivre, 2:12) was a wonderful mare, possessing speed equal to the sire, and some are of the opinion more. She had to her credit a half mile paced in 59 1/2 seconds. Her family relations are high class and among the fastest. She was purchased by Mr. McKinnie of the Centlivre Brothers. The Gerald colt at the time the picture was taken was four months old. He is a beautiful black, with not a white hair on him, and shows a wonderful gait for his age.

To Mend a Broken Leg.

A broken leg of a fine young pure bred pullet was mended by winding carefully with surgeon's plaster, which can be bought for a few cents per roll at the drug store. It is not the same as court plaster. Wind closely, the courses overlapping, but not so tightly as to stop circulation. The bird was turned loose at once and received no further care, but the leg seems as good as ever after four or five weeks.—D. H. B. in Farm and Home.

Fruits on Rented Farms.

The Metropolitan and Rural Home gives the following sensible advice. Fruits should be planted and kept up on rented farms. There is no reason why a landlord should not take interest and see that the tenants are supplied with small fruits, grapes, etc. The leases should be for a long time, and plants and vines should be furnished, the renter to plant and take care of them. Strawberries fruit the year after planting, raspberries the second year, blackberries and grapes the third year and tree fruits from the third to the seventh year. There is no reason why both landlord and tenant should not take an interest in these things.

Lima Beans.

Lima beans demand considerable potash and lime. Wood ashes are consequently beneficial to them, but if ashes are unobtainable the potash salts will be found excellent. A light application of nitrate of soda will give the young plants a good start.

MISTAKEN IDENTITY.

A Senator Who Knew but Little About Police Affairs.

One of the press associations recently sent away on another mission one of its men—the regular man assigned to the White House—and put a new man in his place. Well, this new man was a good reporter in his old field, but he had no extensive acquaintance among public men, such as is necessary in handling the White House news. The new man took his place in the news paper corps on duty there and was getting along swimmingly. When the old man of the force "hold up" public men he joined in the process and became quite familiar with some of the frequenters of the White House. One day Senator Dietrich of Nebraska stopped in and walked into President Roosevelt's room.

"Who's that?" inquired the new reporter, as Senator Dietrich went in.

"Oh, that's Lieut. Kenney of the tenth precinct."

"Oh, yes?" said the new man. "I have met him, I believe, and I will see him when he comes out."

Senator Dietrich came out in the thick, and the new man went for him in good style.

"Oh, lieutenant," called the reporter to the Senator, who was a few paces ahead.

Senator Dietrich turned around to meet his questioner, but didn't show that he was anything else than a police lieutenant.

"How are police affairs? Talk to the President about anything interesting?" queried the new reporter.

Senator Dietrich's face assumed a puzzled expression, but he answered: "No, I didn't talk with the President about anything of importance."

By this time the old-timers in the White House corps were about to explode with laughter, but held in for the new man had asked, "How is the mounted squad getting on, lieutenant?" and then they burst into an uncontrolled uproar, which was joined in by Senator Dietrich himself. They were not laughing, but making a few curt remarks and proceeded to explain that he had been "fished" and was sure that he had bothered the Senator. PLOTS AGAINST LOUIS PHILIPPE

Several Attempts Upon the Life of the King of the French.

Louis Philippe, king of the French after experiencing several minor attempts on his life, was nearly murdered July 28, 1835. The day was one of the three appointed to commemorate the revolution of 1830. The king was with three of his sons, taking part in a procession, and while riding along the boulevard a violent explosion is said from a window overlooking the line of route. Happily, the king himself and the princes escaped uninjured though fourteen persons were killed outright and forty others wounded. Or investigation the discharge was discovered to have come from a machine constructed of twenty-four musket barrels, laid horizontally on a single frame and so adjusted as to be raised or lowered according to the angle required, says the Gentleman's Magazine. The touchholes communicated by means of a train of gunpowder, and consequently all the barrels could be discharged simultaneously. The window being placed stood open, but Persian blinds not opened until the moment of discharge, screened it from the public gaze. It is probable that, owing to some delay in removing the blinds, the life of Louis Philippe was saved. He had hardly passed when the explosion occurred, actually wounding the horse he rode. The man who was guilty of the outrage, a Corsican named Fieschi, was seized and subsequently guillotined. Three more attempts were made on the life of the same monarch. One by the discharge of a walking-stick gun into his carriage June 25, 1838; another, at Fontainebleau, in April, 1840, while the third and final act of the kind may be recorded as having happened when the king was standing on the balcony of the Tuilleries one day in June, 1846.

HAITIAN HONESTY.

Haiti is the only country in the world "where black rules white." Although the present republic is not successful because so large a portion of the citizens are lazy and uneducated, yet the people have many good qualities which according to Hesketh Pritchard, show themselves in unexpected and contrary ways.

One of the things that strike one most is that Haiti is a country of extreme contrasts. Logic is always at fault. A Haitian's honesty is like a Haitian's mind; it is apt to surprise you round old corners.

For example: Hundreds of thousands of Haitian dollars pass annually along the lonely track between Jacmel and Port au Prince. The men who bear them are low-class Haitians; ragged, unclean, uneducated, wild and untamed. Yet only once have the dollars failed to arrive. I have heard it said that ten dollars might tempt the Haitian's cupidity, but ten thousand awe him into immaculate honesty.

During the last thirty years uncounted coffers have made the desolate journey over the mountain passes, each with his load of wealth, and there is only this one instance known of the betrayal of trust. A fine record!
