#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1902.

A Joint Re olution proposing to amend section one of Article fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebrasks, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ERACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1 That section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

\*\*ection 1. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journa s. with the year and nays, and published at least

members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journa's, with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a ewspaper is published, for thirly days immediately preceeding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if a m jority of the electors yoting at such election on such proposed amendment, shall your to adopt such amendment, the same shall become a part of this Constitution. When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to yote on each amendment or amendments shall have written or printed thereon the following: For proposed amendment or amendments shall have written or printed thereon the following: For proposed amendment to the Constitution relating to there insert the subject of the amendment) and against proposed amendment to the Constitution relating to there insert the subject of the amendment) and the vote of each elector voting on such and the vote of each elector voting on such amendment or amendments shall be designated by the elector by making a cross with a pen or recill in a circle or requare to be placed at the right of the lines the words "For or Against" the proposed amendments as he shall desire to yote thereon, or by Indicating his preference on a yot or machine when such machine is in use.
