Agana, Island of Guam.—July 10, 1902.—REPUBLICAN.—I never realized the honored position of Guam so clearly as on the 4th of July. At 12 a. m. or at midnight, the 4th was ushered in by a naval salute of 21 guns. Guam, in fact, ushered in the 4th of July for all Americans. Here the days for Americans begin. This is the first inhabited island owned by the U. S. on this side of the 180th Meridian.

While we were celebrating our national day, you were enjoying the evening of July the 3rd.

This is truly a place of flowers, fruit and perfumes. The "Ilang Ilang" trees are full of their fragrance, and may be scented for quite a distance. There are other large trees with spreading tops, which are a mass of large red flowers. The lilies grow everywhere and are full of rich flowers all the year. The bread fruit trees are very full now, and they look very much like trees full of water melons. The fruit is palatable, rich, and much used by the natives. Bamboo shoots have grown this year fully 20 feet high, without leaf or limb; they look just like green flag poles. You can form some idea of these bamboo shoots by imagining an asparagus shoot 20 feet tall and two to four inches in diameter. The bamboo is not strictly a tree, but simply grass. Native superstition has peopled all the bamboo thickets with ghouls; and they say that all who truly believe, can see the old ghouls and their huts in the thickets. All around this island are caves, and in many places the caves are inhabited by natives who cannot speak or understand any language, other than a gibberish among each separate family or families. I enclose a program of our school entertainment in English. When we came, none of the pupils could speak or understand a word of English. They gave this program quite plainly. The governor and his family, and all the naval and marine officers were present. They all expressed surprise that the children had accomplished so much. Judge Pressy said he did not expect half such results. I wish I could send a picture of our hall on that evening. American flags from the U. S. steamer Justin, covered the entire ceiling. Frederica palms were in all the windows and corners. Cocoa palm leaves 8 to 12 feet long were fastened to the sides of the room in beautiful form. The stage was a forest of plants and flowers. The

children were all in immaculate white, and really reminded one of fairies amid verdure and blossoms. This entertainment practically ended our first school year in Guam. The work hereafter will be very much easier, and far more interesting. The governor very kindly gave my wife an assistant, which will make her work very easy. In speaking of the governor's kindness, which has been most frank and marked. We have always a feeling of gratitude for Judge Pressy, who is the "power behind the throne" here. It is the policy of the government to leave men here only two years, so most of the naval and marine officers, as well as the marine battalion, will be called away very soon. We hope the new governor and officers will be as pleasant socially and otherwise as those now here. However, it will be very difficult to supply the place of Governor Schroeder and his family.

The weather continues very pleasant, though the rains are more frequent and the air more damp. In no place can sleep be more enjoyable than here. We can sleep all night, and then relish a sleep during the day. It is the natural repose from ennui. We sleep with no care of the world's affairs. It is both a physical and soul repose.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1902.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend section one of Article fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1. That section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 1. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fourths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journals, with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published, for thirty days immediately preceding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if a majority of the electors voting at such election on such proposed amendment, shall vote to adopt such amendment, the same shall become a part of this Constitution. When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to vote on each amendment separately.

All ballots used at such election on such amendment or amendments shall have written or printed thereon the following: For proposed amendment to the Constitution relating to (here insert the subject of the amendment) and the vote of each elector voting on such amendment or amendments shall be designated by the elector by making a cross with a pen or pencil in a circle or square to be placed at the right of the lines the words "For or Against" the proposed amendments as he shall desire to vote thereon, or by indicating his preference on a vote 12 machine when such machine is in use.

I, Geo. W. Mansur, secretary of state of the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled, and engrossed bill, and that the same was duly filed in the office of the secretary of state of Nebraska, for its adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the State of Nebraska, this 15th day of September, 1902.

Done at Lincoln this 22nd day of July in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Two, of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh, and of this State the Thirty-sixth.
