The following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1902.

A Joint Re-olution proposing to amend section one of Article fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebrasks, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Sither branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journa's, with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published, for thirly days immediately preceeding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if a mijority of the electors yoting at such election on such proposed amendment, shall you to be added to the submitted to the same shall become a part of this Constitution. When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to vote on each amendments parately.
