As you ought to know, personal taxes are due October 1st of each year, and are delinquent and subject to distress warrant being issued Feb. 1st of each year following. Land tax is due Oct. 1st, delinquent May 1st, and advertised Oct. 1st, and sold to highest bidder, or at private sale Nov. 1st after date of becoming due, so govern yourselves accordingly. The law says you shall appear at the treasurer's office and pay your taxes, and if you do not, the county treasurer shall collect personal taxes by distress warrant after the above dates. I believe that nearly everybody wants to pay their taxes without costs, and I have concluded to take this means of notifying everyone through the press. Do not neglect this matter, but attend to it as soon as possible, as I do not want to make you any extra expense, but I must and will collect delinquent taxes according to law, as I believe that was what I was elected your treasurer for. Republican Resolutions of Custer County

The republicans of Custer county in convention assembled, reaffirm the principles of republicanism as set forth in the national platform of 1900.

We congratulate the people upon the happiness and prosperity that has come to them as a result of republican policy and republican legislation. Wages were never so high, nor producers so well compensated for their products as now. Men were never so well housed, clothed and fed, and have never before had more contentment of mind than during the years since republican policy has been enacted into law.

We congratulate the President and the Army on the satisfactory progress made in the Philippines in suppressing the insurrection and establishing order, and we unqualifiedly endorse the policy of our government therein. Our flag is in the Philippines and there it will remain until such time as the American people may deem it expedient or proper to give the islands a free and independent government, such as it has just given Cuba.

The American Army has taken up the work of maintaining authority in the Philippines, and while we deplore and severely condemn any instances of cruelty which may have occurred, we remember our soldiers are fighting a barbarous and treacherous foe which has inflicted most revolting and inhuman atrocities upon its prisoners. It is the Nation's Army drawn from every section of our country, knowing no politics nor creed, but fighting the Nation's battles under the Nation's Flag; and we resent with indignation, the recent democratic efforts to drag its honor in the dust and cast reproach upon its fair name.

We congratulate the republican party for the faithful fulfillment of the pledge made at its national convention of 1900, to give the oppressed Island of Cuba a free and independent government, which was consummated at Havana on May 20, by the withdrawal of the American troops and the turning over of its government to its own people.

We commend our present county officials for their business like methods in the administration of county affairs.

We congratulate the people of Nebraska upon the present prosperity of our state, and we commend the business like and economic methods employed by Gov. Savage and the state officials of his administration, which have resulted in a saving to the state in comparison with preceding administrations of nearly two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Be it further

RESOLVED, That we disapprove of the inequality of the present methods of the assessment of property for taxation, there being no two counties assessed upon the same basis. We therefore demand that our revenue laws of the state be amended so that every dollar's worth of property or franchises shall be assessed at its actual cash value, and that the levies be decreased to the lowest possible number of mills, that will provide sufficient revenue for county and state purposes. Be it further

RESOLVED, That it be the duty of the attorney general and county attorney to see that the law is properly enforced; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recommend the calling of a constitutional convention in the near future, or that the question of amendments to the constitution be submitted to the people of the state for their ratification.

In the understanding that the Hon. F. M. Currie is a candidate for the position of congressman from this congressional district; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we recognize in Mr. Currie his eminent fitness for the place; and as a mark of our confidence, we do hereby authorize him to name the delegation to represent his interest in the congressional convention.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1902.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as follows: **BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:**

Section 1. That section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the journals with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published, for thirty days immediately preceding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, and if the electors voting at such election on such proposed amendment shall vote to adopt such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution. When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to vote on each amendment separately as he shall desire to vote thereon, or by indicating his preference on a voting machine when such machine is in use.

I Geo. W. Mearns, Secretary of state of the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and as grossed bill as passed by the Twenty-seventh session of the legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and added the great seal of the state of Nebraska, this 22nd day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh, and of this state the Thirty-ninth.
