MARRY OUTSIDE OF SECT.

Jewish Exclusiveness Seems to Be Breaking Up.

"Is Jewish exclusiveness a legend rather than a reality?" asks the London Chronicle, in connection with the following data from Australia, which would seem to suggest an affirmative answer. In New South Wales, according to the recently published matrimonial statistics, during the last year no fewer than sixty-seven Jewesses selected husbands from the Church of England, while seventeen, mated with Catholics and eleven found their affinites in the Presbyterian fold. One hundred and fifty-one Jews were united to Ang. an wives, sixty-two to Catholics, thirteen to Presbyterians, twelve to Methodists, four to non-denominationalists and two to Congregationalists, while a solitary son of Israel is reported to have wed a Baptist. Altogether out of 781 Jewish marriages, 341 were more or less "mixed"—a favorable showing for modern Anglo-Israelitism.—Baltimore Sun.
