Boys Must Not Smoke.

The state board of health, through its secretaries, placed itself on record, by the adoption Thursday of the following resolution, as against the use of tobacco by minors under the age of 18 years. The resolution recommends the passage of House roll No. 224.

"Whereas, as practitioners of medicine, we know from our observation and from the teaching of our leading authorities that the use of tobacco is very detrimental to the moral, mental and physical development of the youth of our land, and

"Whereas, House Roll No. 224 has been introduced in the legislature of this state, the object and purpose of which is to lessen the use of tobacco by the youth of our state.

"Therefore, be it resolved, by the board of secretaries of the Nebraska state board of health, that in the opinion of the members of this board the provisions of said House Roll No. 224 are just and wise and the same should be incorporated into the laws of this state, and that we ask our senators and representatives to unite in their efforts to secure its passage."

House Roll No. 224 was introduced by Representative Gregg. The text of the measure follows:

"Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Nebraska, that hereafter in this state no minor under the age of 18 years shall smoke or in any way use any cigarettes, cigars or tobacco in any form whatsoever in any public place, highway, street, square, or resort. Any such minor violating the provisions of this act shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than one, or more than ten dollars, or be imprisoned for two days for each offense, in the discretion of the court."

The bill also has the support

of the educational interests of the state, and Superintendent Fowler will take an active part in endeavoring to secure its passage.—Lincoln Daily Star.
