Erroneous and delinquent tax committee reported as follows:

We your committee recommend

that the claim of Elmer Bass for \$2.38 on receipt No. 9219 for the year 1895, and J. H. Davidson for \$1 on receipt No. 1792 for the year 1902, and of W. H. Nelson for \$12 personal tax for the year 1901 in Sargent township, be rejected. And that the request of G. W. Wilde for an adjustment of taxes on lot 2, block 13 city of Broken Bow for the year 1890 be rejected. We also recommend that the county treasurer be instructed to issue to the county the tax sale certificate on lot 8 block 79 R. R. addition to Broken Bow, for taxes for the year 1897 to 1901 inclusive and to present the same to the clerk for assignment upon the payment of not less than 50 per cent of the face of the tax and advertisement fees. Broken Bow Triumphs Over Sargent.

The Basket ball team of the Broken Bow High School defeated the team from the Sargent High School in a spirited game on Saturday last, on the High school grounds. Though greatly out weighed, the local team outplayed the visitors at every point. The Broken Bow team work was well nigh perfect. Again and again when their goal was threatened the agility of Douglas or Wilson would secure the Ball and then would follow quick, brilliant passing until the Ball would be again in the territory defended by Sargent. The work of Douglas and Wilson, the Broken Bow Guards, was of an exceptionally fine order, and to them belongs the credit of the low score made by Sargent. Humphrey at center played a fast and heady game, two goals from the foul line and one field goal out of four chances during the first half, and one field goal in the second half makes a creditable record. Osborne, though suffering from rheumatism; put up a strong game, scoring a goal from the field in both halves. McCandless scored a field goal in each half and played an aggressive, masterly game. The game was a very interesting one, apart from the fact of victory. The visitors and their coach, Prof. Vaus showed themselves to be at once thorough gentlemen and sportsmen.
