Southern Fruit and Vegetable Growing.

The fertile lands along the Louisville & Nashville R, R. in Alabama, West Florida and Mississippi are veritable bonan-zas for the fruit grower and truck gardener. One man sold from one single acre, 100 bar-rels of radishes for \$900.00, gross; another patch of 4 acres radishes yielded \$1,463,00, net. In the spring of 1902, another truck gardner sold 300 barrels of potatoes in Pittsburg from 3 acres of ground for \$1,548, and after paying all expenses, cleared \$892,00, or \$297.33 per acre. Within two weeks after selling his potatoes, corn was up and watermelon vines were running on the same land. He harvested his corn, sold his melons, and afterwards cut two crops of hay off of the same land and on January 20, 1903, was planting it again in potatoes. Straw-berries yield from \$300,00 to \$550.00 per acre; as high as 12,480 quarts of luscious berries have been grown on a single acre. Address


