The Latest About the County Fair.

The prospects for the County and Street Fair, to be held at Broken Bow Sept. 1 to 4 are decidedly flattering at this time, and it is an assured fact that if the weather is favorable, Broken Bow will see the largest crowd that ever assembled there during Fair week.

The information which comes to the Secretary's office indicates that, not only Custer county will turn out en masse but that there will be a heavy crowd from adjoining counties. The number of race horses that will be in attendance has already assured a splendid racing program. The exhibits in all departments will, no doubt, be the largest and best that have ever been seen in this county. Quite a number of tent shows will be on the grounds, and the concessions of various kinds already let to privilege people is amazingly large.

The various attractions that have been advertised, including the balloon ascension, the bronco riding by Billy Binder, the wonderful rifle shooting by Captain Hardy, and the sham battle by Company M, etc., etc., are all positively arranged for, and will take place.

The Fair, this year, will have the grandest array of entertainment that the people of Custer county have ever seen at any one time. A strong feature of Fair week at Broken Bow will be the splendid attractions which have been arranged for the Street Fair at night. The streets of Broken Bow will, in every way, put on a carnival appearance. Brilliant illuminations have been provided for. Platforms will be erected, and the free open air shows will be put on so that they can be viewed by the enormous crowd to the very best advantage. Miss Rose Vinton is under contract to put on the slide for life, a wonderful and thrilling feature in which she slides down a rope fastened to a fifty-foot tower, hanging by the hair of her head. Three expert trick bicyclists are expected. Charles R. Dean, a renowned song and dance artist, has been contracted for. Another strong attraction of the Street Fair will be moving pictures, which will be exhibited on a huge canvas in open air, at intervals of ten minutes each evening. No County Fair in Nebraska has ever presented the attractions that are positively under contract at this time. It is the intention of the management to give the people the best entertainment ever seen in Nebraska.
