Robert Ross gave a dance at his home last Tuesday night. Those who were there report a good time.

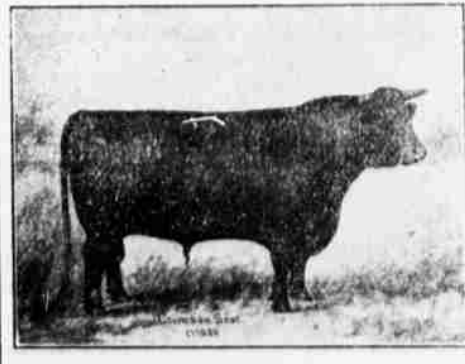
The rain on election day did not prevent many from attending the election at Anselmo. All excitement about election is now over.
