line. The cars on this road were carriages, wagons or carts, always covered and frequently loaded with pumpkins, corn, oats, wheat, straw or fodder for ballast. Generally in this case the ballast was in the cabin and the passengers were in the "hold" of the ship with the hatches securely fastened down so that no "wooly head" could peer out from under the loading.

The ties of this road were generally made of rails split like fence rails and laid down in such a manner that they formed what we called corderoy roads and the cars passed over them or across them instead of lengthwise. This was a little rough, but the cars seldom left the track unless the engineer was informed that there was a train close behind him filled with slave hunters and

bloodhounds in which case, unless he was very near a depot he would switch his train and take to the "woods."

The whole train crew often consisted of one man and sometimes two, who were generally fairer than the passengers his train carried. The train was propelled by horses or mules and often you could hear the puffing of the engine for several rods if the train was overcrowded or behind time. I have seen a great many of these train crews, as our residence was on the railroad, but never saw any of the crew drunk nor did I ever know of their carrying weapons. The crews were in uniform so that any one might know them. The pants were blue jeans and their coats were of a drab color and were generally cut swallow tail. The crew had a peculiar dialect which was very dear to them and very assuring to their dark skinned passengers. When the travelers in the car consisted of a man and his wife they were often spoken to in this fashion:

"John thee and Mary had better stop at this station and wait for the next train which may be several days arriving. Be careful and don't make a noise in the depot."
