

HICKS' PREDICTIONS.

"The second storm period in February will be central on the 6th,7th und Sth Owing to the pressure of the Mercury disturbance, the very low barometer and general storm conditions prevailing previous, or first storm period, may not disapear at the normal time, but run into the reactionary period. In such event, violent storms of rain, sleet and snow will develope and run their course about the 6th, 7th and Sth. One of the most general and severe cold waves of the winter need not be a surprise, as a sequel to the storms and a very low barometer at this time. At both the storm periods within the Mercury brace all proper viligance should be practiced against the probabilities of disagreeable if not dangerous storms. Third Storm Period Regular.—This period extends from the 10th to the 16th,

the time being extended beyond the ordinary limits of a storm period for obvious reasons. The cause bearing on this period are the Vulcan disturbances, the Moon at apogee and at new, and the beginning of the earth's vernal equinox. The usual change to warmer will set in to the west, about the 11th the barometer will fall as winds shift to easternly and southernly, cloudiness will gather in the low barometer area and storms of rain turning to snow at last will take their course east across the country during the 12th to 16th. The Moon in apogee on the 15th and at new on the 16th, will tend to draw the perturbations of this period a day or two later."

Fourth Storm Period .- This period is central on the 18th and 19th. The disturbing elements will be the Vulcan reactionary, the Moon on the celestial equator and approaching vernal equinox of earth. This is one of the periods we put down as problematical. Should the low barometer and the higher temperature, which as a rule attends the New Moon, not disappear about the 15th to 17, the 18th and 19th, will be culminating days of a very decided storms.
