Hicks' Weather Predictions.
 Second Storm Period for March "will express itself about the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th. This, as well as all the periods in this month, is dominated by the March or spring equinox. The Moon at last quarter and near extreme south declination, will also be factors in disturbances at this time. The weather will be unsettled and bleak at the opening of this period. It will grow warmer, progressively from west as the period advances, followed by falling barometer, cloudiness, rain and snow. These disturbances will "peter out" into high barometer, cold northerly winds, with continued cloudiness and frequent squalls of snow."
 Third Storm Period—"This period is central on the 11th, 12th and 13th. Basing the presence of the March equinox, and the Moon's apogee on the 13th there is only one other disturbing factor at this time. On and about March 11th, the earth's equator is presented toward the north pole of the sun, on account of which fact there is a regular annual perturbation, attended by an excess of electrical and magnetic phenomena in the earth and atmosphere. Falling barometer, high temperature and wide areas of rain and snow may also be expected about the 12th and 13th. High barometer and cold blustering gales will follow progressively about the 15th to the 16th."
