The Underground Railroad.

CHAPTER XVI.

At the time that Levi Coffin and many others were engaged in giving shelter, food and raiment to the slaves that escaped to the free states there was a man by the name of Jones, who was in sentiment a strong abolitionist and who did not always wait for the runaways to cross the line dividing the slave from the free states, but who like Admiral Dewey by the Spanish fleet, took charge of them wherever he found them. This man lived in Louisville, Kentucky. The colored people of Louisville learning of his kindly disposition towards them frequently applied to him for counsel and assistance when in perplexity or distress. Louisville was the headquarters in Kentucky for slave-traders, buying negroes in Kentucky for the southern market and coffles of slaves were often brought in from the surrounding country preparator to being shipped on the packets for New Orleans and other southern ports. Occasionally husbands or wives, who had been separated from their families would escape from these coffles and make their way to some safe hiding-place among their colored friends, where Jones would be summoned to hear their sad story and to devise some plan of aiding them to escape. proceed to the Louisville and Cincinnati packet lying at the wharf, and in his own or some fictitious name, engage a state-room for the passage to Cincinnati, and get possession of the key to the room. A short time before the boat started and while there was a great bustle on the wharf, and along the gangway he would have the fugitives come on board with their bundles as if they were servants bringing the baggage of their master or mistress, and would direct them by a prearranged signal to pass into the room which he had engaged. Here they found the key on the inside of the door and immediately lock themselves in. After a state room had been engaged, the fare paid, no officer or servant of the boat had a right to go into the room and the passengers would be unmolested on their way to Cincinnati. Jones was always very careful to engage and pay for both berths, of a state-room so that no one else might occupy part of it. Oftentimes Jones would go to Cincinnati on the same boat, that the fugitives were on and then conduct them when there to Coffin's or some other place of safety. The packet boats left Louisville in the morning and reached Cincinnati before daylight next morning, and when Jones did not come himself he would telegraph to Coffin to apprise him of the coming of the fugitives and request Coffin to look out for them. This information was conveyed in a manner that meant nothing to others but was all important to Coffin-Jones et al. Sometimes the message read, "go to box— at the post office and take care of my mail which you will find there." At other times it would read "pay 40 dollars to J. U. Bard on my account;" different numbers being used at different times and on different occasions. Coffin always understood that the number designated the number of the state room occupied by the fugitives and also that he could tell whether it was in the gentlemen's or ladies cabin. Coffin arranged for some one to go when the boat touched the wharf and tap at the door of the state-room in a way that the fugitives would understand, wait till the door opened enough for him to be recognized, then walk away and the fugitives would follow him. A colored person was generally chosen to perform this mission, and passed unnoticed amid the crowd of colored porters, draymen and hackmen, who went up and down the gangway, carrying baggage and assisting the passengers. Sometimes the fugitives had a trunk of clothing and as Jones saw that it was checked

before leaving Louisville, there was no trouble in presenting the check in Cincinnati after the fugitives were housed safely, and obtaining the trunk. By these means alone twenty seven slaves obtained their freedom during one spring and summer. They were sent to Canada where many of them had relatives, who had escaped before them. Escaping detection in all the cases in which he was implicated, Jones was finally arrested in a case where he was entirely innocent, tried and convicted on false evidence. Aiding a fugitive slave was at that time a grave offence, and he was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. On account of some flaw in the evidence or illegality in the proceedings his lawyers obtained a new trial. He was again found guilty by another jury but his sentence this time was lessened to two years.

Some new witnesses having been discovered whose evidence it was thought would prove his innocence a petition was made for a third trial and granted. His bail bond was one thousand five hundred but he could not reach that amount. He was a weakly man and during the winter he became very ill and his physicians thought that he could not survive long unless he could go home and be properly nursed. Finally his bond was reduced to one thousand dollars but it was not expected he should have many friends in a state where aiding slaves to escape to freedom was considered worse than horse stealing. So all the money that his wife and daughter could raise was a little less than \$600 toward indemnifying a prominent citizen who offered to sign his bond if the money was placed in the bank for him if Jones did not appear. So Levi Coffin was written to and the letter found him without any ready money on hand, but he in turn wrote to Thomas Wistar of Philadelphia, a friend, and he secured all the balance of the money except 50 or 100 dollars which Coffin made up and knowing that what was done for Jones must be done quickly. The question was how to get the money to Louisville. The means were not there as now for sending money and so Coffin took the money and attempted to cross the river to apply it and in so doing came with in a very little of losing his life, so treacherous was the ice on the river, but he reached the place and deposited the money; but it was thought best for Jones to forfeit the bond which he did knowing he could not get justice in Kentucky. Several of the abolitionists knew he was innocent of this accusation but guilty of aiding slaves in many other cases. So when Jones had forfeited his bond, remained in Cincinnati where he had gone and the governor of Kentucky sent a requisition to the governor of Ohio for Jones' delivery, but as the Lord would have it Solomon P. Chase was governor of Ohio at that time and they could not work the scheme on that old abolitionist. I believe I have heard of a scheme of that kind by the present governor of Kentucky trying to get Governor Durbin of Indiana to give up one Taylor, but the Hoosier governor isn't built that way. After several years, that is after the war this same Jones, (but that was not his real name, I could tell it but I don't want to,) this same Jones or whatever his name was, entered the Electric Medical College of Cincinnati as a student and there the writer saw him in 1870. He was as bright as a dollar and took to medicine rapidly; earned his diploma and became a prominent physician among the best families of the city. It is said you cannot keep a man down and especially one who wants to get up and so in this case Jones wanted to get up and see every one else elevated whether black or white.
