Citizens' Caucus.

In pursuant to call the citizens caucus met at the court house, Monday night. The meeting was called to order by Ner Hartley. L. H. Jewett was elected chairman and R. D. Pickett, secretary. A committee of three, consisting of A. Morgan, John Lewis and R. D. Rockwell, was appointed on resolutions. The chair appointed Eastham, Leming and C. R. Luce committee on order of business.

On motion of F. H. Young the caucus proceeded to take informal ballot for mayor, while waiting for report of committees.

The chair appointed as tellers Dean, Skillman, Reynolds, Morris and Denker.

The candidates were Apple, 20; Teagarden, 20; Morgan, 9; Dean, 8; Trites, 14; R. B. Mullins, 10; other candidates receiving from 1 to 5 votes.

The committee on order of business made report of following order:

Report of committee on Resolution.
Nomination of candidate for mayor.
Nomination of candidate for clerk.
Nomination of candidate for treasurer.
Nomination of candidate for police judge.
Nomination of candidate for councilmen for each ward.

Committee on resolutions made the following report which was adopted:

"We, the citizens of Broken Bow, Nebraska, in general caucus assembled, do make and publish the following resolutions as the basis of our platform for the coming city campaign. Be it resolved

1st—"That we believe in our city's being governed by the people, for the people and by the people.

2nd—"We believe in the economical expenditure of the city finances and the equitable distribution of public improvements and the continued repair of streets and sidewalks.

3rd—"We believe in the municipal ownership of public utilities and therefore wish to complete city government and approve their act in the purchase of

the Broken Bow Water Works Plant and in the purchase of the lots upon which the city building now stands.

4th—"We believe in the encouragement of beautifying our city homes, lawns and parks and wish to compliment our citizens upon the neat and tidy appearance of the various homes. We would ask our City Council to appropriate such funds as it can afford to the improvement of our city parks that they may continue a source of pride to ourselves and places of pleasure and resort to our visitors.

5th—"We compliment our officers upon the universal good order enjoyed during the last five years and more especially during the year just past and believe it is due to the absence of licensed saloons in our midst.

6th—"We believe in the submission of the question of license or no license of saloons to the vote of the people and we pledge our nominees, if elected, to abide the result of that vote.

7th—"We authorize the Chairman and Secretary of this caucus together with a committee of one from each ward to be selected by the Chairman to fill any vacancies that may occur on the ticket nominated tonight."

On motion convention proceeded to formal ballot for mayor, which resulted as follows: Apple, 45; Teagarden, 25; Morgan, 24; Trites, 14; Dean, 13; Mullins, 10; other votes scattered. Total vote, 145.

The point was raised that some present were voting who had participated in the high license caucus. The chair held they had no right to participate unless they would endorse and support the platform adopted by this caucus. H. W. George appealed from the decision of the chair, and the chair was sustained. As a result the next vote dropped from 145 to 123.

Teagarden and Morgan announced their withdrawal. The second formal ballot was Apple, 64; Dean, 23; Teagarden, 13; other votes scattering from 1 to 5. Total vote cast, 123. Apple having received a majority was declared the nominee.

On motion of Hartley, the rules were suspended and R. D. Pickett was nominated for clerk by acclamation.

On motion of Eastham the rules were suspended and J. M. Kimberling was nominated treasurer by acclamation.

Moved by Morgan that the

rules be suspended and E. G. Schwind be nominated for police judge by acclamation. Vote in doubt and formal ballot taken. Ballot resulted G. Schwind, 48; Holcomb, 23; Shinn, 35, other votes scattering. Total vote cast 126. The second formal ballot resulted in Shinn, 88; G. Schwind, 34; Holcomb, 13. Shinn having received the majority was declared the nominee.

On motion of Armstrong, seconded by Purcell, the chair appointed a committee of three to wait on Mr. Apple, the nominee for mayor to see whether he would accept the nomination on the platform adopted. The chair appointed Armstrong, Purcell and Athey. Mr. Apple appeared before the convention and stated that he was neutral on the license question, but the last two years had voted against license and was getting more convinced that it was the thing to do. He stated, if elected, he would carry out the will of the majority.

On motion the rules were suspended and Ed. McClure was elected city engineer by acclamation. The following candidates were nominated for councilmen:

1st ward—A. P. Johnson.
2nd ward—R. D. Rockwell.
3rd ward—Jos. Pigman.

The chairman appointed as committeemen from each ward to act with chairman in filling vacancies, E. Taylor, 1st ward; F. H. Young, 2nd ward; Dr. Day, 3rd ward.

On motion of Purcell the question of making a levy of 5 mills for the purpose of creating a fund to build a city hall, be placed on the ballot and submitted to a vote of the people.

On motion, caucus adjourned.

Republican Caucus.

Last Friday night the Republican caucus met in pursuant to call at 8 p. m. and was called to order by A. R. Humphrey. Jos. Pigman was elected chairman and R. D. Pickett, Secretary.

Moved that a committee of three consisting of Amsberry, Jewett and Morgan be appointed on resolutions. Jewett declined and Munk was substituted. Motion carried as amended.

The committee on resolutions reported as follows:

"We, the electors of the city of Broken Bow, Nebraska, in caucus assembled, do make and publish the following as our resolutions:

First—"We recommend to the incoming administration an economical use of the public funds, in repairing sidewalks and streets, but believe in having said repairs equitably distributed to accommodate the greatest number of citizens.

Second—"We take pride in the fact we have had no saloons during the past five years and that the splendid order maintained in the city is largely due to that fact.

Third—"We oppose the licensing of saloons but recommend that the question of saloon license or no license be submitted to a vote of the people and the officers elected at our spring election be governed by that vote.

Fourth—"We invite all citizens regardless of party affiliations but who are in favor of the above principles to join in the nomination and election of a ticket that will carry out these ideas.

Fifth—"We recommend that our city parks be improved to the extent of the financial ability of the city, so that the same may continue as places of pleasure and comfort to our citizens and visitors."

Moved and seconded that resolutions as read be adopted. Carried.

Moved by Humphrey that the caucus proceed to nominate a mayor.

Moved by Hearty that we adjourn to Monday night.

Moved by Morgan to amend that we adjourn sine die.

Amendment carried.

The caucus then adjourned and the chairman announced that there would be a citizens caucus held Monday night to nominate a ticket.
