MEN GET THE MOST MONEY.

Figures on Salaries of Teachers in the State.

LINCOLN-Boos the man teacher descree a bester salary than the woman teacher who does the same work! The table of increase for the last six years, as prepared by State Superintendent Fowler, shows that the lowest average salary paid the man teacher exceeds the highest one paid the woman teacher by \$1.77, and that the highest salary paid the man teacher exceeds the highest paid the woman by \$11.19. Despite the increase in salaries, the number of men teachers has steadily decreased. In 1903 the decrease of men teachers and the corresponding increase in women teachers amounted to more than 16 per cent.

One of the reasons, other than flaancial, given for the defection of the men is that it is found that women are much more successful in the lower grades than are men.
