A Winning Ticket.

The republican state convention held yesterday in Lincoln was the largest attended in the history of the party in the state. The meeting was called to order at 2:15 by Chairman Lindsay, who introduced H. H. Bolding as temporary chairman, who delivered an address eliciting frequent applause. The only county sending contesting delegations was Scotts Bluff which was settled in favor of the Westervelt delegates.

The convention was addressed by Ex-Senator Thurston in his usual happy and eloquent style. The convention nominated Hon. E. J. Burkett for U. S. Senator by acclamation. The vote in favor of endorsing a candidate for U. S. senate was carried by a vote of 2 to 1.

Gov. Mickey, Treasurer Mortensen and Lieut. Gov. McGilton were renominated by acclamation. Norris Brown, Deputy Attorney General was also nominated by acclamation. A warm contest was had in nominating the other state officers, but the strife was friendly and apparently no sore spots were left.

A. Galusha was nominated for Secretary of State; E. M. Searle, Auditor; Peter Mortensen, Treasurer; J. L. McBrien, Supt. Public Instruction; H. M. Eaton, Land Commissioner. C. H. Morrill was elected National committeeman, and P. A. Walton of Broken Bow, was elected district committeeman from this senatorial district. The selection of chairman of state committeemen was left to state nominees. It is practically conceded that Judge Wall will be the man.

We will give the names of the state delegates at large to the national convention and the electors next week. The ticket is considered a strong one and doubtless will be elected by a large majority.

Proclamation.

In accordance with a time honored custom the people of Broken Bow and vicinity will observe Decoration Day by appropriate services and the decoration of the soldiers graves at the cemetery. That the day may be properly commemorated and due reverence shown to our departed soldiers, I would ask that all places of business in this city be closed on May 30th, 1904, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 12 m. and between 2 and 4 o'clock p. m. I would further ask that our militia company, Fire Department, Sunday schools and the citizens generally assist in the proper observance of the day. GEO. W. APPLE, Mayor.
