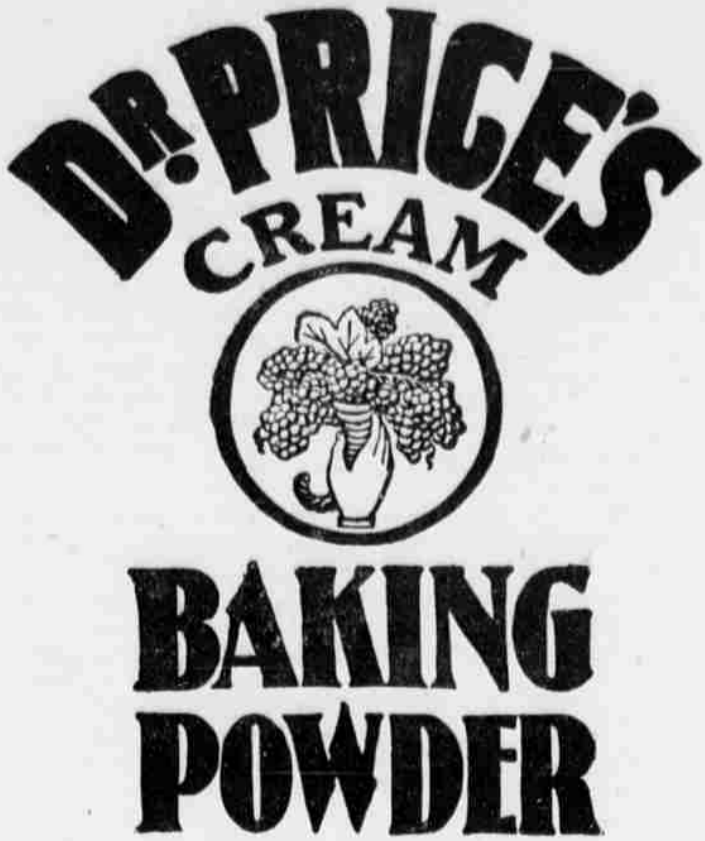

a long southern sweep, around the end of the Basin and the communicating lagoons. The slope is 300 feet wide with a rise of 60 feet. Between and beyond the cascades are the great lawns with their rich embroideries of flowers. Cement walks and flights of easy steps are provided throughout the vast gardens and a liberal use of sculpture completes the decorative detail. The English country seat garden of 200 years ago is among the most interesting features of this class of exhibits. The Cascades are a striking feature of the Exposition. They are three in number and are said to far surpass, in size and beauty any work of like character ever attempted in the world. The central Cascade is much larger than either of the others. This has its beginning in an artistic hood or building just in front of Festival Hall, which stands out from the center of the Terrace of States. The water gushes forth from this fountain 20 feet above the level of the Terrace, spreads out into a stream 45 feet wide and 14 feet deep and leaps down the long slope over the steps, spreading to a width of 150 feet as it plunges into the Giant Basin.

### LINCOLN LETTER.

May 23, 1904.

The state board of equalization and assessment held an open meeting today and listened to the representatives of several railroad corporations which had been requested to furnish the board with a little information in addition to the voluminous reports and schedules already on file.

Newspaper stories to the effect that certain members of the board disagree upon the method of assessing corporations, and that there is a wide discrepancy between the estimates made by members of the board are absolutely without foundation. In the first place it can be said with positiveness that the assessment as finally made will be the assessment of the whole board as the method of arriving at railroad values has been agreed upon by all members; in the second place, there can be no discrepancy between the estimates because there are no estimates. The board is estimating nothing, guessing at nothing, jumping to no hasty conclusions. The assessment it will make must be water-tight and capable of withstanding any attack which may be made in the courts. To make such an assessment and insure that none of its decisions will be resisted, the board must be able to show to the courts as well as the people and the corporations that it has based its values upon something more than an idle guess or "estimate," and while no man is in a position to say just how high the railway assessment will be, all of this care and caution on the part of the board seems to indicate that the appraisement will be resisted by the railroads, if by anyone at all, and that the people, or at least all fair-minded people, will be entirely satisfied with it.

E. T. Roberts of Lincoln, has been appointed bailiff of the supreme court. No other appointments were announced at the last sitting. Mr. Roberts is a resident of Lincoln and is highly respected here.

Clerk Lindsay and Deputy Clerk Seymour took charge of the office Friday.

In the annual competitive drill held at the university, Saturday, Company "A" won the first prize and was presented with a large silver cup by Governor Mickey who praised the work of the cadets most warmly. Company "B" received the second highest score and company "C" was a close third and undoubtedly would have stood much higher had not "someone blundered" while the company was in platoon formation.

Treasurer Mortensen's statement that the disbursement of school moneys last week would exceed \$435,000 and break all previous records proved to be entirely true; in fact his estimate was safely conservative as the actual figure proved to be \$443,288, or more than \$13,000 in excess of the much-vaunted distribution made by a fusion treasurer at a time immediately after the panic, and when back taxes and rentals were flowing into the treasury in a torrent.
