The Nebraska Commission to the St. Louis Exposition has placed at the disposal of the Nebraska Improved Live Stock Association the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay transportation charges on Nebraska live stock to the St. Louis Exposition, the money to be divided as follows:

For horses.....\$ 400 00
For swine..... 400 00
For sheep..... 200 00
For cattle..... 1 000 00

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Live Stock Association it was decided that all live stock to participate in this offer of free transportation must be exhibited at the Nebraska State Fair, excepting horses, which must be shown before the State Fair. All horsemen who wish to take advantage of this offer must notify the Secretary, O. E. Mickey at Osceola, Nebraska, prior to July 1, 1904, and must be filed with the Secretary by that date or be barred from participation in free transportation.

If enough entries are filed to warrant it, a committee will be sent to examine entries and pass upon their merits. All other live stock will be chosen from stock exhibits at the Nebraska State Fair and all animals given free transportation must be owned in the state by residents of Nebraska.

Exhibitors are requested to notify the Secretary of the number of head to be exhibited, stating breed, age, sex, name and number of animals, and class in which they will be entered. Entry blanks will be furnished by O. E. Mickey, Secretary, or by the Department of Live Stock at St. Louis. Entries must be made at St. Louis for horses on or before July 16, and will be received at St. Louis after August 18, and their exhibition will begin August 22, and close September 3, 1904.

Entries for cattle must be filed on or before July 30, at St. Louis, and will be received from September 8, and exhibition will begin September 12, and close September 24th.

Sheep and swine must be entered on or before August 20; will be received on September 29, and the exhibition will begin October 3, and close October 15, 1904.

All entries sent to the Secretary will have prompt attention and it is earnestly wished that all parties who enter, or have entered, directly to exposition authorities will also send full particulars of their entries to the Secretary. The revised "entry list" and "prize list" is now ready and may be obtained of the Chief of the Live Stock Department at St. Louis.

ORDINANCE NO. 43.
An ordinance fixing the amounts of the salaries of city councilmen, city marshal and street commissioner, and consolidating the two last named offices, and providing a fine and penalty for resisting or abusing any peace officer of said city, and providing a penalty for betting any money or anything of value upon any horse race, base ball game or other athletic game or games, and providing a penalty for any person who shall unlawfully strike or wound another within the city of Broken Bow, Nebraska, and to repeal sections 2 and 4 of ordinance No. 19 of the city of Broken Bow, which was passed, adopted and approved and ordered published March 23rd, 1904.
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of Broken Bow:
Section 1. The councilmen of the city of Broken Bow shall each receive the sum of \$2000 per year for their services as such councilmen to be paid in quarterly installments at the end of each quarter and the city marshal and street commissioner, which said offices are hereby consolidated, shall receive for his services the sum of \$2500 per month, to be paid at the end of each and every month.
Section 2. Every person who shall within the corporate limits of the city of Broken Bow bet any money or anything of value upon any horse race, base ball game or other athletic game or games shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$1000 and not more than \$5000 at the discretion of the court and in the event of the imposition of said fine he shall stand committed to jail until such fine and costs are paid.
Section 3. Every person who shall resist or abuse any peace officer of this city in the proper discharge of his duties, the person so offending shall be fined in any sum not less than \$1000 and not more than \$5000 at the discretion of the court and in the event of the imposition of said fine he shall stand committed to jail until such fine and costs are paid.
Section 4. If any person shall unlawfully assault or threaten another in a menacing manner or shall unlawfully strike or wound another within the city of Broken Bow, the person so offending shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$1000 and not more than \$5000 at the discretion of the court and in the event of the imposition of said fine he shall stand committed to jail until such fine and costs are paid. Provided, that a conviction under this section shall not relieve the person convicted from liability to respond in damages at the suit of the injured party.
Section 5. Sections 2 and 4 of Ordinance No. 19, passed, adopted, approved and ordered published March 23rd, 1904, are hereby repealed, provided, however, that said repeal shall not affect any suit or suits or offense heretofore committed under said sections 2 and 4.
Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
