What Mr. Taylor objects to is that the Chief did not give the names of those who so strongly opposed the resolution and proceeds to name "R. E. Brega, Fred Cummings, H. J. Shinn, E. R. Purcell, W. P. Higgins and J. G. Painter, three lawyers, one editor, one banker and one true populist as the ones who so strongly opposed the resolution." Mr. Taylor further states, "that the resolution was not defeated more than two to one, and that a time of day when many of the farmer delegates had left."
