DEAR SIR:—On the 20th of June there was a young man about 16 or 18 years old killed by the cars near here and in his note book we find your address and so I thought it better to write you and see if you know anything of such a boy. He weighed about 115 pounds, had brown hair, about 5 feet 4 inches high and had blue or grey eyes.

There was nothing on his body to give us any clue as to where he came from or what his name was either.

His body was so mangled and torn that we had to bury him today in the potter's field at the expense of the county of Weber this being where he was killed.

Hoping that you may know the boy so that we might let his folks know of his tragic death and relieve them of much worry and pain, I am,
