The interest in the Japan-Russian War will be of secondary importance until the democratic war at St. Louis is over.

Col. Bryan lost in his first battle to oust the Parker delegates from Illinois. "The Cross of Gold and Crown of Thorns" seem to have lost influence with the Nebraskan among democrats.

Ex-Senator Allen well said that he would not be a candidate for president on the populist ticket unless he could get the nomination unanimously. He did not seem to have any supporters in the convention.

The populist national convention at Springfield, Ills., Tuesday, nominated Thos. P. Watson of Georgia, for President, and Thos. H. Tibbles of Lincoln, Nebraska, for Vice-President. Only about two hundred delegates attended the convention.

The details of the first day at the Broken Bow land office under the Kinkaid act, as recorded in the local papers, indicate just the reverse of a situation calling for the presence of the militia. The crowd of landseekers were orderly and quiet, and there was not the remotest suggestion of any serious misconduct.—Lincoln Daily Star.

Teachers Institute.

The Custer County Institute for teachers will convene in this city, July 18th. Supt. Lewis has arranged for a three weeks session. We understand that able instructors have been secured and that an effort will be made to make it one of the most profitable sessions for teachers that has ever been held.

A feature of the Institute will be the presentation of practical methods and theories of teaching along with the textbook matter, which will not only be of great value to the beginner but to all who have a desire to keep abreast with the times of the progressive age in which we live.

Every teacher in the county should avail herself of this opportunity for better preparation for her work. Better wages are being paid for good teachers. The better equipped one is the better the chance of a good position.

Three weeks is a very short time to gain a great deal and no one should defer the date of starting. In the past a number have waited until the second or third week before enrolling, their main object apparently being to secure an enrollment so as to comply with the law. In all such cases the teacher is the loser. Something good can be secured every day and every day you are absent just that much will be lost.
