The Day an Ideal One And Thousands Participate. The biggest celebration ever held in Custer county on the Fourth was enjoyed in this city Monday. The day opened clear and bright and the event was ushered in with sunrise salute of 128 guns under the management of J. J. Johnson and S. M. Dorris. By 7 o'clock teams began to arrive from the country and by 10 o'clock the town was full of people. Trains from both east and west were loaded with those coming to enjoy the festivities of the day with us. The band furnished music in the park while the crowd congregated. A 10 o'clock procession was formed of the floats provided by the business men, ladies and gentleman on horse back, the militia, the Ansley and Broken Bow bands, Sunday School delegations and citizens in carriages. Among the noticeable features of the parade was the float, Columbia with 48 attendants, consisting of little girls from 8 to 12 years old, dressed in white, representing the 48 states and territories, drawn by eight horses. Among the trade floats represented in the procession were Ryerson-George, J. C. Bowen, The Star Grocery, Broken Bow City Mills, The Custer County Chief, The County Agricultural Society, Rockwell & Armstrong, the Standard Oil Co. The Sunday Schools in line were the O. K., Custer Center, Union Valley and Bethel Union. The procession was over a mile long. The exercises in the Park were opened with prayer by Rev. Geo. P. Trites. This was followed with the address of welcome by Mayor G. W. Apple. The Declaration of Independence was read by Minnie Shinn. Music was furnished by the Broken Bow Band and chorus of vocal music by members of the several church choirs. S. J. Lonergan presided. E. P. Campbell formerly of this city now a resident of California was first introduced as the first speaker, who was greeted heartily by those who recognized him as one of the early settlers. Next introduced was T. J. Majors, the orator of the day. Mr. Majors address met with frequent applause. The afternoon was occupied in carrying out the sport program which consisted of foot races, etc., shower of pennies for boys and girls, hose contest, tug of war, and a game of base ball between Ansley and Broken Bow, in which the former won, the score standing 6 to 7. The fireworks at night was witnessed by a large crowd that remained over. The display was the largest ever given in the city. No one was injured throughout the day and the best of order prevailed. A heavy rain followed soon after the fire works which made it disagreeable for those who had started home and for those who had a long wait for the belated extra trains that had been arranged for to carry them home; a musical program was provided at the opera house to entertain them, but owing to the rain a

large number did not go to it. Several of the merchants kept their stores open until midnight to accommodate the waiters. We understand that Ryerson-George kept their store open all night. Woman Suffrage. Some one has said "Woman is not women's friend and never was." This seems to be as queer an assertion as, "Man's worst enemy is himself." We do not see where women have any complaint to make, as grounds for a right to vote. A man who would vote against Woman's interests and just rights would be looked down upon by the whole human race. In all organizations, Government and partnership, the executive authority is placed in one person. Therefore it seems just and proper that each family should have an executive, and all families do, some may be rulers unconsciously. Sometimes the wife is the real ruler of affairs and often she is the most competent and justly holds the place, other times the success of the family is ruined by her rule. Are there enough women at the head of families to justify equal suffrage? In any case the laws are unjust to the woman it should be righted. If a man and woman with \$1,000 each, get married and afterward be divorced, the woman would retain her \$1,000 and 1/3 of his property. There is surely no injustice to a woman in such a law. One of the strongest pleas for woman suffrage is taxation without representation. Let us see if they are unjustly taxed or wronged in any way. She pays no more tax than the man with an equal amount of property, while he has a road tax to pay and she has not. We fail to see where she could better herself by representation and still have equal rights with men. They think it a shame to franchise the ignorant negro and not franchise the woman. They forget they will franchise as many ignorant negro women as there are negro men. In Colorado, where woman suffrage has been in force for a number of years, the people are now having a government that do not respect the constitution of the United States. Men are being sent out of the state without due process of law. The constitution gives every man the right to trial. The proceedings which are going on in Colorado are unjust and a disgrace to our nation. If the women voters of Colorado by the aid of a few just men would stand for justice such a condition of her government would not exist. Some of the women who have been in politics were very rude, making insulting remarks, that had to be borne because they were women. There is not a respectable man in our country who would not lay down his life, if necessary, for the protection of woman. Do you think that men do not respect the rights of women above that of man?
