Teacher's Institute Closed.

The Teachers Institute of a three weeks session closed last Friday. The total enrollment was 239. The attendance was larger than reported from either of the three Junior Normals, held at North Platte, Holdrege and Alliance. A Big Yield of Oats.

Chas. Wachter on the East Table near Merna, began threshing his sixty acre field of oats last Saturday, which was turning out 90 bushels to the acre. We said two weeks ago that the farmer in Custer county that had not raised a crop worth \$1,000 this season was the exception rather than the rule. If oats continue to yield at that pace we will have to double our estimate, excepting only the hailed district. Think of 90 bushels to the acre on 60 acres at 22 cents a bushel, the present price of oats, \$1,188 for the oat crop alone.
