No one can question the ability of A. R. Humphrey for County Attorney and his election will not mean a salary at the county's expense to educate him in the duties of his office.

Over confidence is the great danger the republicans have to face. The only sure way is for every republican to go to the polls early and see that his neighbor does not stay at home.

Republicans should remember that a vote for either a pop or democrat candidate for representative or senator will be a vote for Bryan for United States Senator. A vote for the republican candidates is a vote against Bryan. Vote your ticket straight.

revenue law and Governor Mickey was well received by the audience.

F. J. Drumm of Callaway, should have the unanimous vote of his party in his district for supervisor. No republican can afford to do otherwise than vote for him.

A vote for M. L. Fries for the State Senate is no experiment. Mr. Fries did the state valuable service in the legislature two years ago and his experience will enable him to do even better in the next legislature.

The re-election of A. H. Copey is a foregone conclusion. His straight forward and fearless record in the legislature two years ago meets the approval of the people and his election is assured with an increased majority.

John Scott of Westerville, is not only entitled to every republican in the district for supervisor, but every vote in Westerville township regardless of their party affiliations. ### Berge a Corporation Candidate.

It is a little surprising that the fusionists who have always claimed to be opposed to corporation rule are supporting Berge for governor.

The corporations did every thing possible to get the courts to declare the new revenue law unconstitutional that they might get out of paying their just proportion of the tax. The state board of equalization and the supreme court refused to grant them their wishes.

Then they turned to the populist and democratic party and got them to pass a resolution demanding the repeal of the revenue law.

Berge accepted the nomination for governor on the corporation platform and is canvassing the state under the guise of reform, when as a matter of fact it is a campaign of the railroads, the big insurance companies, the Omaha packing houses and every other corporation in the state that want to have the new law repealed in order to shirk their just share of the taxes as they had been doing under the old law. Under the present law the insurance companies are compelled to pay two per cent of their gross receipts into the state treasury. Every other corporation must pay a like sum on its franchise. The railroads have to pay taxes on twenty million dollars more than they did under the old law. No farmer or business man can afford to vote for Berge or a fusionist for the legislature. They are pledged to do for the corporations what the state board and courts refused to do. Vote for Mickey and the entire republican ticket and keep the affairs of the state out of the control of the corporations.

### Lincoln County Populists Protest against the Nomination of W. B. McNeel, a Parker Democrat, as their Candidate for Congress.

The following protest has been issued by the Populists of Lincoln county, and is being circulated and signed by a great many members of that party in Lincoln county:

"We, the undersigned Populists of Lincoln county, Nebraska, hereby register our disapproval of, and vigorously protest against the action of the Chairman and Secretary of the Congressional Convention of this Congressional District in issuing a certificate of nomination, as the Populist candidate, to W. B. McNeel of this county, who had already been nominated by the democrats, and assign the following reasons for such action:

"First—Because it does not represent the sentiment or will of the Populists of this district, nor of even a respectable majority of them. Two men only participated in this nomination, and they received their authority if any they had, from a convention attended by delegates from Dawson and Buffalo counties alone.

"Second—Because Mr. McNeel was, at and before the time of his nomination, an openly avowed anti-fusion Parker Democrat, and so stated on the streets of North Platte immediately before entering the convention, where he was nominated on that very issue, the convention giving very positive expression of the sentiment 'no fusionist need apply.' The first question asked regarding every candidate by those unacquainted with him, when his name was presented, was 'is he a Pop?' and the next 'is he in favor of fusion?' and they showed very plainly they had no use for either. In his speech of acceptance Mr. McNeel emphasized this sentiment and announced that he would make a vigorous campaign for Democracy and that noblest of Democrats, and most eminent jurist, Alton B. Parker.

"Third—Because we esteem it an insult to the intelligence and sincerity of every Populist in the district to ask or expect him to vote for any such candidate committee as Mr. McNeel is to that very plutocratic element to combat which the populist party was organized.

"To give this protest the greatest possible effect we hereby pledge each other that we will not only refrain from voting for Mr. McNeel, but will make every vote count two in support of this protest by voting for Hon. M. P. Kinkaid, the Republican candidate, and we recommend and urge our Populist brethren throughout the District to adopt the same policy."

### W. V. Mathews.

Willard V. Mathews, one of the republican candidates for representative in this district, resides in Callaway, which has been his home since 1886, when he located there with his father, Dr. A. L. Mathews, one of the founders of the town. Willard was quite a small boy at that time, and spent the first few years in Custer county, afterwards taking a short course at the state university. Since he came of age he has been engaged in business in Callaway, and is now associated with his father in the live stock business, and is also agent for the Omaha Elevator Company in that city, quite a responsible position which he has held for several years.

Mr. Mathews is known as a good business man, otherwise he could not hold his position as representative of the elevator company, which does a very heavy business in the grain and live stock business at Callaway. We are informed that his services are very satisfactory to his employers, and that he also enjoys the confidence and esteem of the many farmers with whom he has dealings.

Being bright, intelligent and

having the faculty of making friends with those with whom he comes in contact, we believe he will make a good representative. ### Jess Gandy for Berge the Corporation Candidate for Governor.

We notice in last week's Beacon that Jess Gandy comes out in a long letter endorsing Geo. W. Berge, the corporation candidate for governor. It would be unkind to suggest that Jess has a fish to fry and like the ducky with the coon it is a ground hog case, its Berge or no fish. But the more charitable construction to put on Jess' endorsement of Berge is that he like a great many others who do not reason from cause to effect is that he does not know he is playing into the hands of the corporations of the state by supporting Berge and the fusion ticket. The corporation failed to get the legislation they wanted through the republican legislature. Then they sent their best lawyers before the board of equalization. Failing there they went into the supreme court to get the revenue law repealed. Then they went to the leaders of the populist and democratic parties and had them insert a plank in their platform demanding the repeal of the revenue law, promising their support in return. Berge is the nominee for governor on the fusion ticket to carry out the requests of the corporations. As a blind he is declaring himself opposed to railroad passes, thus implying that he is not in sympathy with the railroads.

Probably no class of people would be more pleased than the railroad officials if a law was passed prohibiting granting of passes. Custom and circumstances compels them to grant many favors to common classes that they would prefer not to grant. An anti-railroad pass law would give them an excuse refuse such courtesies and they then would put in employ only a few strikers in each community and pay them in transportation and their work would be accomplished just the same. A vote for Berge and fusion is a vote for corporation control of the state of Nebraska. No farmer, nor business man, day laborer or any other than a corporation tool can afford to vote for any of the fusion candidates.
