They are: E. J. Burkett, First District, Lincoln; John L. Kennedy, Second District, Omaha; J. L. McCarthy, Third District, Ponca; E. H. Hinshaw, Fourth District, Fairbury; G. W. Norris, Fifth District, McCook; M. P. Kinkaid, Sixth District, O'Neil. Kennedy beat Hitchcock of Omaha by 800 votes.

J. T. Arthur, populist, of Comstock, was re-elected supervisor in his district over John Scott by 100 or more votes. He carried Sargent by 99 votes, and his own township, Douglas Grove. Scott carried his own township, Westerville, by 33 votes.
