## NEWS IN NEBRASKA

### ROOSEVELT'S PLURALITY 84,833.

Complete but Unofficial Returns from Nebraska.

Unofficial, but complete returns for the state of Nebraska show that the vote on president at the last election was in the neighborhood of 225,000, or about 16,000 less than was cast four years ago. Of the votes cast President Roosevelt received 137,513; Parker got 52,697; Watson, 20,522; Swallow, 6,305; Debs, 7,380. This gives Mr. Roosevelt a plurality of 84,833, and a clear majority over all of 50,626.

On governor the vote was very nearly the same in total as for president. Governor Mickey received 111,707; Berge, 102,470; Swander, 5,277; Vail, 5,087; Mickey's plurality, 9,237.

The unofficial returns from the ninety counties of the state on president follow.

### THE STATE IN BRIEF.

A new lighting company has been organized at Plattsmouth.

York will ask congress for \$125,000 for its proposed federal building.

The farmers in the vicinity of Adams, Gage county, will build an elevator.

The remains of Frances Claflin, who died in Washington, have been interred at Fremont.

The Doane college lecture course opened at Crete with an address by Dr. D. F. Fox of Chicago.

Fifteen divorce cases are on the docket of the district court of Gage county to be disposed of.

Joseph Geissel, a young man, is wanted at Tecumseh on the charge of forgery. He has fled the country.

Fire destroyed the large barn of John Boatman, A. R. Case's barn and several other smaller buildings in Sterling.

George Tuttle, a former resident of Gage county, was shot and killed in Colorado last week. The shooting was the result of an old feud.

Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Williams of Peru celebrated their golden wedding. A large number of their friends and relatives were invited to celebrate the event.

E. J. Burkett has filed a statement with the secretary of state certifying that he spent \$425 during the last campaign to get his third term in congress. This he gave to the state committee.

At a recent meeting of the school officers of Dodge county the proposition of appointing a county trustee officer was discussed. The proposition was left to the decision of the directors.

F. R. Ingalls, a Long Pine jeweler, has mysteriously disappeared. His wife died a week ago. He bought a razor Wednesday. Suicide is feared. He tried it once. Searching parties are working.

The faculty of the State Normal school at Peru has adopted appropriate resolutions regarding the death of Miss Bertha Knight, a teacher in the Lincoln school at Omaha, who graduated at the Normal last June.

The state banking board rejected the applications for license of the Continental Finance company of Chicago and the Co-operative Home Purchasing company of Omaha. The latter company claims to be operated for the benefit of the colored citizens of Nebraska.

In a game of base ball between Chadron and Crawford, Harry Ketcham of Crawford was seriously injured. He had his shoulder dislocated and received internal injuries, the effect of which cannot yet be determined. Harry is a son of Editor Ketcham of the Crawford Tribune and is a fine young man and universally liked.

In York county some of the country schools have declared vacations for periods ranging from two to four weeks. The object of the vacation is to give the boys a chance to don husking pegs. The school law makes it imperative to take some such step as this. According to the wording of the law, the boys cannot be kept out of school in any other way, as the amount of attendance required during the term must be consecutive.

Printed orders have been issued by the Union Pacific instructing its ticket agents to accept no more signatures with fountain pens or ink furnished by passengers in purchasing transportation. This rule has become necessary owing to the ease with which forgeries were accomplished by the use of inks. Hereafter the company will furnish a brand of ink which the traveling public cannot use excepting under the direction of the agent who sells the ticket.

Ed Johnson's hardware store at Clark was entered and about \$15 worth of knives and razors were stolen. Before noon Frank Avery, alias Gussie Mills, was arrested and charged with being the guilty party.

Mrs. Richard Gould appealed to Governor Mickey to parole her husband from the penitentiary and the case has been taken under advisement. Rev. Gould was convicted of running away with a 15-year-old girl, Eva Flint of Central City, and living with her in South Dakota. The wife told the governor that she needed her husband at home to help take care of their five children, for whom she has been making a living since her husband's conviction.

Northern Nebraska is suffering from an epidemic of typhoid fever, which is serious to a degree, and the lives that are taken every day roll up to an astounding list of people. Just what is the cause of the illness has not been determined, as the fall has been dry and warm. In Norfolk it is claimed by some that the disease is due to the standpipe, which is unscrubbed at the top. It is claimed that there are several bushels of dead birds in the bottom of the pipe.

It is quite likely that Peter Kuhn, wanted in Beatrice on the charge of forgery, will not be brought back from Kansas City, as Fritz Kees, on whom he passed a forged check for \$75, received a draft from one of Kuhn's sons at Kansas City for \$50. He stated that the balance would be forthcoming in a few days.

James Coffman, a 14-year-old son of E. Coffman of Nebraska City, was shot in the leg by another boy, who was shooting at a mark and missed the mark. Physicians think that the leg will have to be amputated.

### Flesh of Bear and Camel.

In Germany bear's flesh is greatly favored, and smoked bear tongues, hams and sausages are both appetizing and expensive. Ever since Paris, in the siege of 1870-71, was driven to eating up the animals at the zoo, camel's flesh has been demanded by French gourmets. Remarkably like beef in appearance, it is as tender as veal, and there are Parisians who import it regularly from Algeria.

### Wood in Iceland.

Iceland has been found to be not so destitute of trees as commonly reported. Prof. Prytz of Copenhagen finds that it contains trees of considerable size. A country so cold will not stand the reckless destruction of trees which it has endured in common with other more heavily wooded regions. With care it is believed that Iceland may yet be covered with forests.

### Simple Remedy for Glass Wounds.

If cut by glass examine wound carefully, cleanse with antiseptics, holding the wound over an empty bowl and repeatedly squeezing the antiseptic into the wound. When sure that there is no glass left in, wet a compress in the solution and bind on with a dry bandage. For a simple cut wet compress in antiseptic solution and bind on firmly.

### Saved with Fishing Rod.

While fishing in Lifford reservoir the caretaker of Stirlchley Institute, Birmingham, England, saw a domestic servant named Annie Curtis throw herself into the water. Being unable to swim, he cast for her with the rod, and, catching the hook in the girl's clothing, he managed to bring her safely to shore.

### School Children Are Wily.

Under a new rule women inspectors visit the public schools of London and inspect the pupils. Those that are not clean are sent home. But already it has been found that some of the children smear themselves with mud before entering school, in hope that an inspector will pay a visit.
