After 16 days looking over western Nebraska, D. J. Omstead writes from which this extract: Corn is better than in the Territory. Did not go into the sand hill country, so saw no place where a section could be home-steaded in one body—80 and 120 tracts plentiful, but a man must have more than that as he cannot depend on farming—must keep stock as well. Most farmers make their money from cows. John Flynn milks nine cows and sells the cream for 45 per month. I was out two weeks with a team from Custer county. It is the country to make money in. I know men there that have got rich since 1895. In '94 was the big drought. They lost everything. Now they have 70 to 80 head of cattle, 25 to 30 head of horses, and keep 70 to 80 hogs, own from one to a section and a half of land, with fine house and

barns. Fruit is plentiful. If any one wants to know particulars about the country I will gladly answer questions.—The Owasso Leader, (Indian Territory.)
