Whereupon the chair declared the motion carried. The roll was then called and the vote was as follows: For Osborne—Fonda and Thorpe. For Bass—Greenwalt and Scherenger. For Cooper—Fenimore, Morris and Arthur. Scott Cooper having received the highest number of votes the chairman declared him elected. It was moved and carried, that the Poor Farm, Court House and Jail Committee be instructed to take out at least \$300.00 additional fire and lightning insurance of the court house. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded, that the Board now adjourn to 9 a. m. Monday. MONDAY, JAN. 16, 1905. Board met at 9 a. m. All present. Minutes of Saturday read, corrected and approved. Committee on official bonds reported as follows: We recommend that the bond of F. H. Bentley as justice of the peace of Ansley precinct, be approved. The special committee appointed to check up the accounts of Mr. Thorpe, chairman of the Poor Farm committee for the year 1904, reported as follows:

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT.
Broken Bow, Jan. 9th, 1905.
Report of the chairman of the Poor Farm, Court House and Jail committees for the year 1904. Your committee submits the following report: The general condition of the farm is good. We have sold from the farm.....\$2,661.54 Paid out..... 2,400 71 Balance on hand.....\$ 260.83 Of the said balance, there is \$13.59 in the hands of the committee, for which find check attached. Your committee has expended for hog fence during the year 1904, \$231.85. I would recommend that the board fence, with hog tight fence, as fast as possible all fields that can be used for hog pasture to advantage, as I am firmly convinced that to the hogs raised on the farm we must look for the money to carry on said farm. We have expended during the year \$275.00 in full blood Durham cattle believing that the County Farm should quit raising scrub cattle. We think that by having 50 acres of bromo grass we can pasture our cattle on the farm, and not be obliged to send the cattle to public herds. All of which is respectfully submitted. G. H. Thorpe, Chairman.

COMMITTEE REPORT.
We your committee appointed to check up the accounts of G. H. Thorpe Chairman of the Poor-Farm committee for the year 1904, respectfully report that we have checked his accounts and have found them correct. Jos. Fenimore, A. Fonda.
