Farmers Institute Made Permanent.

At the Farmers Institute held here recently a permanent organization was effected, with the view of holding annual meetings in January each year. The officers elected for the ensuing year were: J. D. Ream president, J. E. Cavene vice-president, Willis Cadwell secretary, A. C. Towell treasurer. Executive committee J. G. Brenizer, John Reinhardt, M. E. Vandenberg, B. P. Morris and John Pirnie. It was recommended that the county poor farm as far as practical be operated on the experimental plan in advanced system of agriculture in accordance with the experimental station at Lincoln. The chairman of the poor farm committee was added to the executive committee. Willis Cadwell donated \$25.00 to a fund to meet the expenses of the next institute. Sixty names were enrolled in the organization.

The committee on resolutions, consisting of G. R. Russom, J. T. Arthur and J. G. Brenizer, submitted the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

We your committee on resolutions respectfully report as follows.

Whereas, The Farmers Institute in session January 6th and 7th, has been of extraordinary interest and discussion of all topics ably handled.

We desire to especially thank the speakers from the state for the valuable suggestions offered and also papers and addresses by local speakers.

Realizing the necessity of creating interest in bee keeping, as effecting the horticultural interests of the county, we wish to especially thank Mrs. A. L. Amos for her exceedingly valuable and interesting paper on bee keeping.

We further recommend that the secretary be instructed to publish the paper presented at this institute.

We further endorse the resolution of the committee on nominations, that the county farm, in so far as practical, be used as an experimental farm under instruction of the state farm at Lincoln.

We also suggest that the annual meeting of this society to be held in January 1906, take up in a much larger sense the subject of corn growing and that an especial exhibit be made of corn and that appropriate premiums be offered in connection therewith.

Senator Burkett.

The house and senate in separate sessions Tuesday cast 118 votes for E. J. Burkett for United States senator, 9 for Metcalf of the World Herald, 1 for Sorensen and 1 for Douglas. The entire republican strength of both houses of the legislature was cast for Mr. Burkett with the exceptions of Muken and Tucker of Omaha. The fusion crowd of nine united on Metcalf of the World Herald. Mr. Burkett will succeed Senator Dietrich March 4th. The vote of the two branches of the legislature was ratified yesterday in joint session. The effort of the opposition news papers to prejudice the public against Burkett charging he was the choice of railroads will have but little effect with those who are posted. There probably never was a senator elected from any state freer from corporate influence than Elmer J. Burkett. He commenced his campaign a year ago with the view of submitting his candidacy to the vote of the people. The republican state central committee requested that the counties pass upon the question of submitting the question of U. S. senator to a vote of the people. Nearly every republican county convention passed resolutions endorsing the plan, and a large number of the counties endorsed the candidacy of Burkett. The only counties that did not, were charged with being under corporate influence. The state convention both endorsed the plan and endorsed Mr. Burkett's candidacy. His name was placed on the ballot and he received a very large majority of the votes cast. There was nothing left for the legislature to do but to carry out the expressed wish of the voters. The issue was practically settled at the polls last November by the people, and not by any corporation or clique. Mr. Burkett has served three terms in congress from the first district in Nebraska and his election is due to his ability and popularity with the votes of the state. He is a native of Iowa, a graduate of the Tabor college and is in his 37th year.
