Nebraska News

While her brother and a neighbor boy were playing with a loaded 22-caliber revolver the weapon was discharged and 10-year-old Mabel Crable of Hastings was painfully wounded in the arm.

Dr. L. R. Brown has filed suit in the district court against the village of Pierce and Mrs. L. M. Mohrman for \$10,000 damages, alleging as the cause a defective sidewalk on the lot of Mrs. Mohrman.

Fred Shannon of Beatrice, a brakeman on the Burlington line running between Nebraska City and Holdrege, broke his left leg between the ankle and the knee by a fall he received while at Holdrege.

Alexander Petros of Chadron has been appointed steward of the Norfolk asylum by Governor Mickey. He will begin his duties as soon as the asylum is open and will receive a salary of \$1,200 a year.

A case of smallpox is reported in Nemaha county at the home of Charles Shurtleff, the patient being Miss Kate Tucker, a sister of Mrs. Shurtleff, who recently returned from a visit to the western part of the state.

George W. Frank, Jr., at one time one of the most prominent citizens and business men of Kearney, died at Liberty, N. Y. Funeral services and interment took place at the former home of the family in Warsaw, N. Y.

Mrs. Charles Roebuck, residing in Inland township, about six miles southwest of Harvard, was stricken with paralysis while out to the barn getting a basket of cobs. Medical aid was at once summoned, but she died.

James D. Myers, a pioneer resident of Gage county, dropped dead at his home in Odell. Mr. Myers was once engaged in the banking business at that place, but retired from active business life some years ago. He was 82 years of age and is survived by a widow and one son.

Superintendent Johnson of the state institute for feeble minded youths reported to Governor Mickey the condition of one of the female inmates of the institution and laid before him suspicions as to the culpability of a former employe. It is said she will become a mother in a few months.

Leon H. Miller of Omaha, an alleged railroad promoter, was brought to Beatrice by Deputy United States Marshal Homan, on the charge of sending obscene literature through the mails. At the close of his hearing before United States District Commissioner Cobbe he was bound over to the federal court, his bond being fixed at \$1,000.

George H. Spear, one of the prominent traveling men of Nebraska, proved to be a mighty lively corpse when he arrived in Norfolk from the Black Hills the other day. Reported dead by his friends, he had been the cause of no end of worry in Norfolk. Mrs. Spear had become particularly concerned and was under severe strain until her husband appeared.

The county supervisors of Platte county are in a sort of a quandary over the matter of who shall be paid the reward of \$400 which was offered a year ago for the capture of James Kelley, who was afterwards convicted of the murder of Arthur Snowden. The reward is claimed both by Sheriff West of Butler county and Sheriff Bauman of Fremont.

Despite the fact that they have lost a sugar factory at Norfolk, northern Nebraska farmers are already making contracts for furnishing beets to other institutions next summer, and, singularly enough, more acres of beets have been contracted in the vicinity of Norfolk for next year to supply the factory at Ames than were contracted for at the same time last year for the plant in Norfolk.

Through the confusion caused by a child fainting a cry of fire was raised at the Pheland opera house in Alliance, which resulted in a panic among an audience composed entirely of children that would have proved disastrous had not members of the company and other cool-headed people worked energetically for a few minutes. As it was, several children were slightly injured.

Word has been received in Nebraska City from Rudolph Evans, the sculptor, who is in Paris designing the statue of the late J. Sterling Morton for the Arbor Day Memorial association, stating that the figure is in the hands of the bronze foundries and will be completed in time to be shipped early next month. The granite work will be delayed, but everything will be completed in the coming spring.

Considerable excitement is manifest in Greeley over the application to Governor Mickey for the pardon of Michael Lamb. No less than ten petitions were put in circulation charging Lamb with having kept a rendezvous for criminals before his conviction and causing the death of three young men, two of whom were killed while resisting arrest, and that the petitioner believe Lamb should serve the full nine years for which he was sentenced.

The next session of the Southwest Nebraska District Teachers' association will meet in McCook, March 21 and April 1.

State Fish and Game Commissioner Carter has completed his biennial report to the governor, showing that during the last biennium the department has cost \$20,249.02 for maintenance. During the same period the income of the department was \$14,280.43, leaving a net amount of \$5,968.59 to be contributed from the general fund in excess of the amount turned over by the commission.

Pays for Stolen Vest.

Some months ago the vicar of Rogate, Sussex, received a letter from Australia asking him to try to find a man in his village who had had his waistcoat stolen thirty years ago. The vicar found the man and told his Australian correspondent. In due time he received a letter inclosing \$50 for the owner of the waistcoat. The writer said that with the \$2.50 he had found in the waistcoat he had gained a new start in life and was now well-to-do.

Money Made by Beggars.

No beggar in New York makes less than \$5 a day, according to the New York Times. They receive contributions varying from one penny to \$25. Some of them are experts in their lines and play only for donations of \$5 and \$10 and upward, telling plausible stories of unpaid rents, dying wives and starving children, of funeral expenses, and other harrowing experiences that appeal to the sympathies of tender hearted humanity.

Juryman's Truthful Excuse.

A juryman who appeared before Sir James Hannen in a London court room recently was in deep mourning and claimed exemption from service on the ground that he was interested in a funeral that day at which he desired to be present. "Oh, certainly," said the courteous judge, and the man went sadly away. "Do you know the man you have exempted?" asked the clerk. "No," said Sir James. "He is an undertaker," was the reply.

Savory Stew Was of Dog.

A few officers of a British ship were dining with a mandarin at Canton. One of the guests wished a second helping of a savory stew, which he thought was composed of duck. Not knowing a word of Chinese, he held up his plate to his host, saying, with smiling approval: "Quack, quack, quack!" The mandarin was an intelligent Chinaman. Shaking his head he pointed to the dish of stew and said: "Bow, bow, bow!"
