One of the boys attached a small bobsled to the big sled, which caused considerable fun and quite a bit of walking.

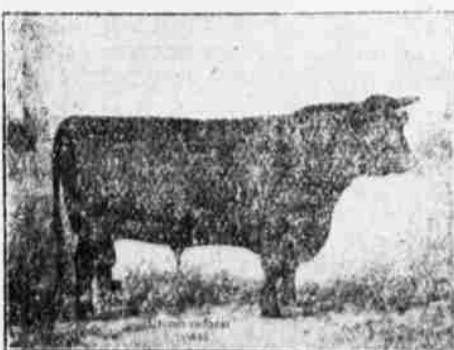

Telephone Delivery of Special Mail.

Senator Millard is in receipt of a communication from Hon. C. J. Garlow of Columbus, Nebraska, enclosing copy of a resolution passed by the republican county convention of Platte county.

This resolution declares in favor of a proposed law to provide for the sale by the government of a special postage stamp which when placed upon a letter and sent through the mails would be authority for the postmaster at point of destination to open the letter and to transmit its contents by means of telephone communication to the party for whom the message may be intended. It is easy to see that this is intended for the convenience of farmers residing in the country whose homes are connected with towns by telephone wires.

Upon inquiry, Senator Millard is advised that there is no legislation pending before either house of Congress on this subject. Last year Senator Fairbanks introduced a proposed amendment appropriating twenty thousand dollars for experimental telephone delivery of special rural mail matter under the direction of the Postmaster General, but the amendment was not acted upon by the Senate. In February, 1903, the senate passed a resolution asking the Postmaster General to inform that body to what extent and in what manner the telephone is used in the collection and delivery of special delivery mail matter, and whether in the opinion of the Postmaster General special rural telephone delivery of mail matter is desirable and feasible. In response to that resolution the Postmaster General, under date of March 10, 1903, made a brief report in which

he stated that the experiment had been tried at ten important post-offices in various states. These experiments seem to have been confined to the practice of telephoning the A. D. T. offices to dispatch boys to the post-office to get special delivery letters to be carried to the addressees.

In reference to the use of the telephones for the delivery of rural mail matter, the Postmaster General reports that it is practicable to use the telephone in connection with the rural free delivery service, especially in those counties or communities in which the service is well established and the telephone generally is used by the farmers or by country stores.

Senator Millard is informed by those who have given this subject consideration, that there is little doubt that the practice may become general within a few years. In a country of such large area as Custer County, Nebraska, where there is an independent system of telephones reaching out from Broken Bow and other railroad towns into the country districts, a special delivery telephone stamp such as that contemplated by Senator Fairbanks' resolution, would operate to the advantage of many farmer's throughout the county.
