D. H. Cramer of Omaha has been awarded the contract of building a 13,000-bushel capacity elevator for Blythe & Patton at Blue Springs to take the place of the one recently destroyed by fire.

The Northwestern hotel and building of Neligh has been sold to Gustave and Louis Bahn, a couple of retired farmers. They will remove the building and replace it with a double brick to be used for a hotel.

The finishing touches have been put on the farmers' elevator at Strausville and it is now in shape to do and is doing a lively receiving and shipping grain business. This is the only farmers' elevator in the county.

Conrad, the little 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Kroeger, of Grand Island, was frightfully mangled and instantly killed by a freight train a few days ago. It is supposed he was endeavoring to jump onto the moving cars.

The Burlington has a large number of men doing rip-rap work along the east side of the Missouri river opposite and southeast of Plattsmouth, to prevent the water from encroaching upon its right-of-way and flooding the lowlands.

In a fit of despondency Mrs. Chas. Odell of Rulo, in the east end of Richardson county, attempted to take her life by administering poison, but reports indicate that the drug failed to do its work and she has about recovered from the experience.

House bill No. 255, the bill pending before the state legislature relating to county bridges does not meet with much favor in Cuming county. The board of supervisors at their regular meeting registered very emphatic objection to the provisions of the bill.

Carl Zepplin, aged 50, who was killed at West Point a few days ago, when his horse stumbled and hurled him to the ground is the fourth brother of the family to meet an untimely death, and others in the line have suffered peculiar ends at the hands of fate. Three of the brothers were killed by horses or on account of horses.

Kirkman, who is under arrest in Valentine, being tried on charges that may result in his dismissal from the army, is said to have tried to commit suicide after he was informed of the suicide of Mrs. Bessie Chandler in Omaha. The story goes that he took morphine and also opened the arteries in his wrist, but was thwarted in his intentions.

G. T. Bastelo of Omaha, supreme deputy of the Bankers' Union, who has been at Table Rock for some time, concluded his labors by organizing a lodge with the following officers: William Bankson, president; P. W. Quackenbos, vice president; Isam Bain, banker; J. H. Talbot, secretary; Nicholas Muller, chaplain; Mrs. M. E. Talbot, overseer; Peter Muller, guardian.

The insane commission was in session at Madison the past three days examining witnesses in the case of Charles Teske, a wealthy farmer of Green Garden precinct, Teske, who had been acting strangely, was taken to a private sanitarium nearly a year ago. He was afterward released and sent home. His brother lodged the complaint against him before the commission at this time.

Russell Leidy, a 13-year-old son of F. J. Leidy, a farmer living near Bowler, Jefferson county, is dead from the effects of a gunshot wound received while hunting.

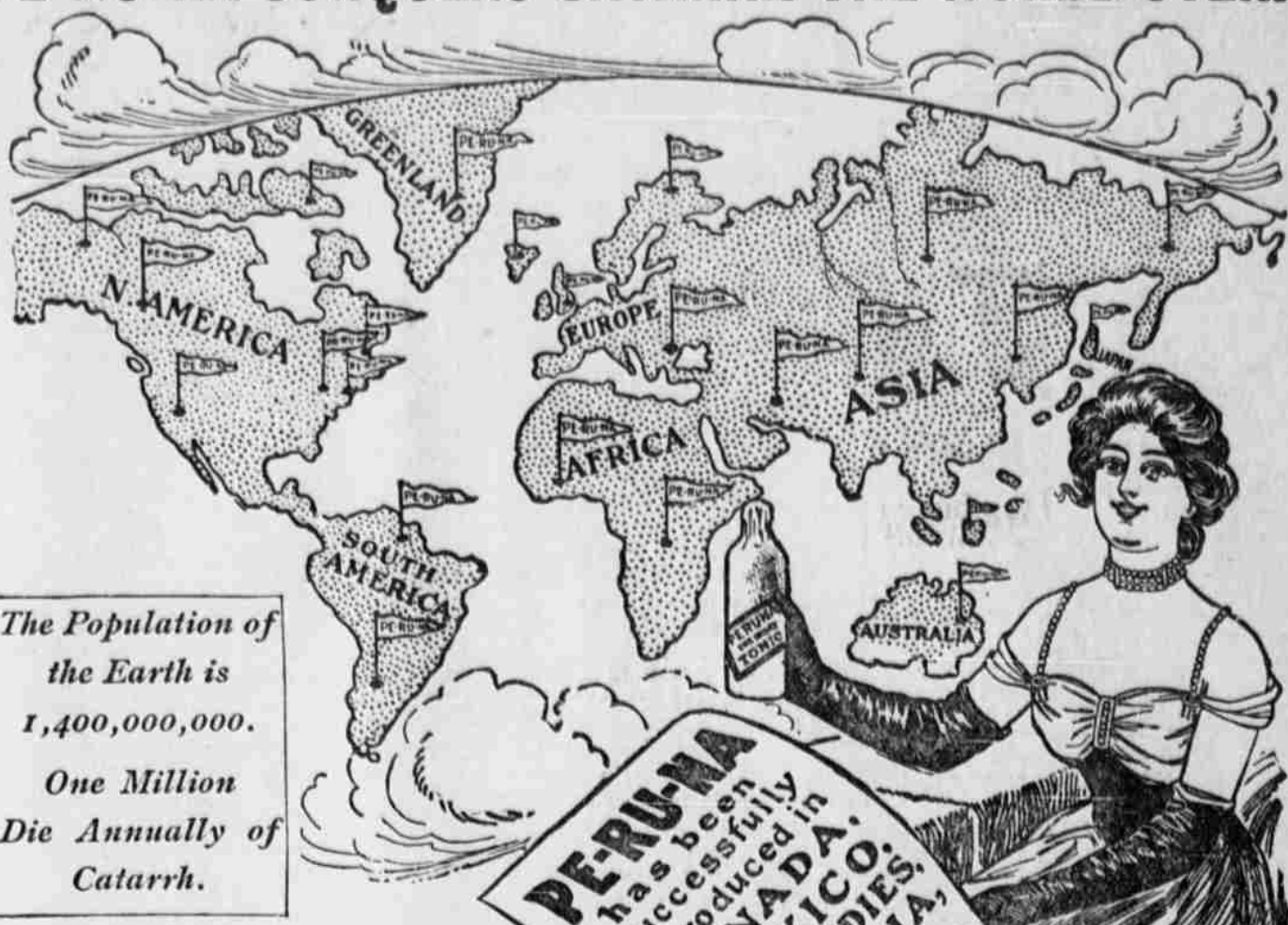

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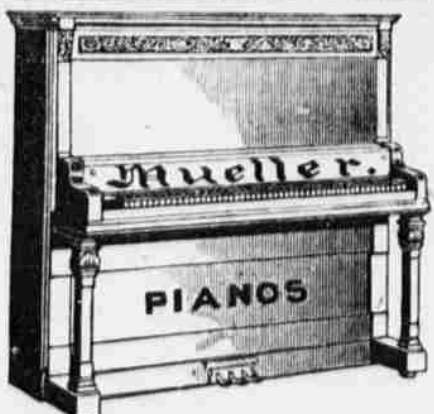

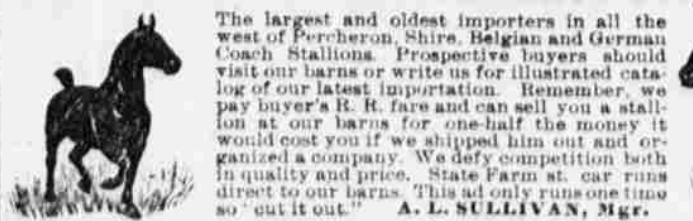
