A. J. Reed of Merna, left with us Tuesday a sample of Japanese or Billion Dollar grass seed. He has been sowing it for three years and is highly pleased with it. He says it will yield from five to ten tons to the acre of hay and forty bushels of seed. It grows tall and rank and makes a fine forage for stock. The substance of the stock is something the nature of sorghum and stock eat it and relish it very much. The seed can be fed to horses the same as oats and they do well on it. Mr. Reed raised a large crop of it last year and was in the city to arrange with the merchants to sell it for him. He has 600 bushels of it for seed. He is selling it at 75 cents a bushel. It requires about the same to the acre as the common millet, from a half to a bushel to the acre. Either he thinks will produce the same tonnage to the acre, but where it is sowed thin the stalks grow much larger than when more is sown to the acre.

### Central Telephone Sold.

J. E. Adamson has sold his interest in the Central Telephone Co. The deal was closed up today. This sale is made subject to the option held by the Co-operative Company. And it is understood that the plant is to be turned over to the peoples board of directors, provided they raise the funds in accordance with their option with Mr. Adamson.

Steps will be taken immediately to improve the service and put the plant in first class condition. The price is not made public.
