RIOTING IN CHICAGO.

One Man Killed and Forty-three Injured.

CHICAGO—The death of one man and the injury of scores of others was the immediate result of Tuesday's fighting between the striking teamsters and their sympathizers on the one side and the police and the non-union men on the other. There were riots in all parts of the city. Men were clubbed and stoned almost to death within a square of police headquarters, and five miles away men were shot down in the streets. At a hundred places between these two extremes of disturbance there were assaults and fights in the streets. Blood was shed on State street, in the heart of the fashionable shopping district, and furious riots took place almost in the doorways of the leading hotel. Non-union men were pelted with stones, bricks and every other conceivable sort of missiles. They were dragged from their wagons, beaten, clubbed and stamped upon. The mobs that followed the wagons on which they rode were ugly in the extreme. But for the splendid service rendered by the police force the list of dead would be twenty instead of one.

The strike situation in Chicago assumed a peculiar aspect Tuesday and at night the interests which have been opposing the striking teamsters are not as united as heretofore. The cause of this slight dissension is the Team Owners' association, which has contracts with the railroads and many of the large firms throughout the city to transfer their merchandise. Until Tuesday it was supposed that the Employers' association and their allies were firmly bound together in the fight for supremacy against the teamsters.

The Team Owners' association, which employs none but union teamsters, flatly refused to make deliveries to any of the firms now involved in the strike when ordered to do so by the Employers' association. When the employers received this ultimatum they notified the team owners that unless they recognized the request that no discrimination be made in deliveries an effort would be made to have all existing contracts between the team owners and business houses and the railroads cancelled.

The Employers' Teaming association sent word to the large team owners that they desired to know where they stood in the present fight. Many of the members of the teaming association have contracts for the delivery of coal with the team owners, who have so far failed to make any deliveries since the commencement of the strike. The team owners would not give a definite reply as to what could be expected of them.

RIFLES FOR DRIVERS.

Chicago Employers Order Two Thousand Guns for Non-Union Men.

CHICAGO—Conditions in the teamsters' strike were worse Monday than at any preceding time. The strikers were in a more ugly mood. The rioting was more open and vicious and the attacks on non-union men were more frequent and daring than at any time since the commencement of the trouble. The chief cause for the increased belligerency on the part of the strikers and their friends is laid to the fact that the Employers' Teaming association has brought 1,500 men into the city to take their places and that 500 more are said to be now on the way, and will arrive within twelve hours. These men will receive the full pay of the union men and it has been guaranteed to them that their positions will be permanent. Among them are 20 farmer boys from all the surrounding states, who have volunteered their services and sought position as drivers.

A new feature appeared in the strike, and it will be in full evidence Tuesday whenever a wagon of the Employers' Teaming company goes through the streets. This feature will be the rifle. The weapon will be carried on all wagons of the Employers' Teaming association in open view.

Roosevelt Trying for Peace.

LONDON—The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "The diplomatic representative of one of the great powers closely connected with the war states that it is undeniably true that President Roosevelt is endeavoring to make peace as soon as possible."

New Phase of Meat Inquiry.

CHICAGO—Freight traffic officials of the various western roads which have been engaged in the transportation of live stock products testified before the grand jury in the investigation of the packing industries. The question of rebates was taken up for the first time, and some of the railroad officials declared that the large packing houses, like other business concerns, always sought law rates, but they failed to give much evidence to support the theory that special agreements existed.

Mr. Charlton to Be Appointed.

WASHINGTON—Secretary Taft on Thursday announced that he had decided finally to appoint Paul Charlton of Nebraska to succeed Judge Charles E. Magoon as the law officer of the insular bureau. As the place was covered into the civil service by a blanket order several years ago it has become necessary before Mr. Charlton's appointment to secure a special ruling from the civil service commission excepting the law office from the requirement of a competitive examination.
