There is to be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

Churches, local, state and territorial organization are to have representatives the same as has been the rule under the organization of the north.

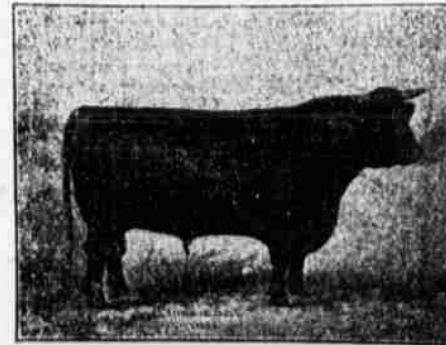
