The Glaze Marble Works.

"Why look for the living among the dead?" are words as applicable now as when uttered by the angel to the sorrowing women on the memorable morn of the Resurrection. Although they had repaired to the tomb of the crucified with sorrowing hearts the disciples found it a place of beauty and rejoicing, in learning that their Master had risen for the glory of men.

The manufacturers of monuments, while they are engaged in a business that represents the dead, their grand mission is assisting the human family in expressing their fidelity and appreciation of their loved ones who have departed this life.

In this line Broken Bow has a factory of which she has reason to be proud, owned and operated by E. D. Glaze and sons. They are not only well equipped for the business with tools and means to turn out all classes of work known to the trade, but they possess the special qualifications of first class designers and artists. They have now on hands a large stock of the American Blue Marble of which they have just added a car load. This enables them to furnish any size monument that may be desired in a very short time. They sent out two loads of monuments Tuesday morning. One load goes in the vicinity of Sargent and the other to Gothenburg. Their territory is not limited by county lines, as they receive orders from the northwest for two hundred and three hundred miles. They have filled a number of orders at Alliance, Crawford, Chadron, and other localities in those vicinities.

They have orders on their books for a number of very fine large monuments to be completed and delivered by the latter part of this month. Among the number is a large monument for Mrs. Lucas, wife of F. H. Lucas, of Anselmo, who died Sept. 11, 1904. The monument is to be erected at Arnold. Mrs. Louisa Wilhoit of West Union, has ordered a large monument for her deceased husband, Emanuel Wilhoit, who died December 24, 1904. Another one is for Mrs. Plymale, of New Helena. Mrs. S. E. Mauck of Merna, has in an order for a large monument for her husband Jacob Mauck, who died February 11, 1905.

There are orders for M. A. Porte or Whitman, for her child, Julia, and for John Keating, of Dunsmuir for his wife, Dora, who died June 1, 1901. L. H. Brown of Mullen, has in an order for his daughter Effie, who died Feb. 8, 1900.

One of the largest monuments on stock at the Glaze marble works has been ordered by Mrs. Julia Talbot, of Ansley, for her husband John Talbot, who departed this life July 13, 1904. These are very fine monuments and will weigh when completed about 2,000 pounds.

The Glaze marble works has grown to be quite an important industry in the city. It employs from five to six men all the time and they buy their stone in car load lots. Their work is all first class and their prices reasonable for the high class work they turn out.

F. M. Hans Acquitted.

F. M. Hans, who was on trial at Ainsworth for killing D. O. Luce in Brown County April 9, 1901, was found not guilty Saturday morning of last week. D. C. Luce was a pioneer settler in Custer County, near New Helena and later moved to Brown County, where he owned a ranch. Luce was living on his ranch with three small children at the time he was killed.

It appears that a number of the horses of neighboring ranches had been found dead on Luce's range and as suspicion pointed to Luce being the guilty party a man was employed to ferret out the offender. He hired out to Mr. Luce and secured such information as resulted in Jack Foster, a ranchman, filing a complaint against Luce. The warrant for Luce's arrest was placed in the hands of F. M. Hans, at that time a detective for the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, to serve. Hans went to the house alone to make the arrest. Luce resisted arrest and was shot and killed by Hans. A coronor's inquest was held and Hans exonerated.

Some two years after a grand jury was convened and found an indictment against Hans, charging him with murder in the second degree. Hans returned to Ainsworth and gave himself up. He was tried and found guilty and was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. A stay of execution was secured pending a review of the case by the supreme court and bail bond of \$10,000 was fixed, which was furnished. The supreme court sent the case back for a new trial, but at a recent session of the district court they filed a new complaint charging Hans with murder in the first degree, and the defendant was committed without bail. It was on this new charge the defendant was tried last week and was acquitted.

Bank of Commerce Changes Hands.

On Monday a deal was consummated, by which W. A. George became the sole proprietor of the Bank of Commerce of this city, he having bought the institution of F. M. Ruble, one of the original incorporators of the bank. The property is to change hands June 1. Mr. George informs us that he will incorporate the bank for \$25,000 as soon as he gets possession and put in shape to do a first class business for Broken Bow and vicinity. Mr. George's well known financial standing will add very materially to the public utility of the institution. His long residence in the county together with his successful business career, coupled with his genial ways and extensive acquaintance insures the bank under its new management a fair share of the public business. Although Mr. George will not be able to give his personal services to the bank during his term of office, he expects to leave the management of the affairs of the bank in competent hands until he can give it his personal service.
