## Important Changes In The School Laws.

1. **TAKES VOTED:**—See page 25 of 1905 School Laws. The district is no longer to vote a number of mills tax, but is to vote an amount of money. The County Clerk, makes the levy. The estimate of money is to be made by the board, and voted by annual meeting. It must be at least large enough to maintain a school for the necessary time. This is at least three months in districts having less than twenty pupils; six months where there are twenty or more and nine months where there are more than seventy-five pupils. Please send certificates of taxes levied with the amount of money to be raised instead of number of mills. This does not refer to bond levies. They are looked after entirely by the county board.

2. **WHERE** no levy is voted at the annual meeting, or where the district votes to have no school, or where no action is taken by annual meeting to provide for school, it becomes the duty of the County Superintendent with the County Clerk to make the levy necessary, and such tax is collected as other county and state taxes are collected.

3. **NOTICES OF ANNUAL MEETING** must make mention of change of site or of purchase or lease of a school house in order to consider legally such questions at the meeting. We regret that this information comes to us thus late. But we suggest as a possible remedy for such omission, that these points be included yet in the notices, and that all voters be notified personally of the change, where such matters are to be considered. By reference to both the new law and the old, this change will be obvious.

4. **THERE** is no authority for adjourning the annual meeting,

to consider change of school site.

5. **THERE** is no binding force to the vote of the annual meeting, not to furnish text-books and supplies; It merely expresses the personal wishes of voters and announces their personal intentions.

6. **THERE** are marked changes in the law relative to teachers' certificates which new law becomes operative October 1st, 1905.

Art. I: The name by which this corporation shall be known is Security State Bank.
