Small Grain Outlook.

We are just up to the small grain harvest in Nebraska. Cutting will begin before the present week closes. The wheat is more forward than last year—perhaps a full week or a little more on the average. The prospect every way is bright.

The Nebraska wheat acreage is undoubtedly larger than last year, but this does not tell the full story. The yield is promising. The best judges believe that Nebraska will this year produce close around 30,000,000 bushels of wheat. And it is going to be good grain. Last year we had an immense amount of wheat that was poor for milling. It will be different this year, for the berry is sound and heavy.

Neither is there occasion to worry about prices. Fully 70 cents a bushel can be paid today on contract at Lincoln on an export basis. This certainly constitutes a fair and encouraging outlook. For our wheat alone, to say nothing of our other small grain crops, this means a gross average return of at least \$25 for every man, woman and child within the boundaries of Nebraska.

The only thing that could not spoil this respect would be extraordinarily bad weather or other harvest conditions, so that the crop could not be saved.—Lincoln Star.

Copper Cable Lightning Rods

There has always been a doubt, entertained by a large percent of the people as to the value of

lightning rods. In fact the lightning rod peddler has been viewed by the general public more of a fake than a necessity. As so many of the lightning rod peddlers have used the business to swindle their customers rather than to give them a square deal. The efficient of the lightning rod has been sincerely questioned and the traffic has grown in disrepute.

But because there are rogues in any line of business it does not follow that there is no virtue in it. This is true of the lightning rod.

W. C. Shinn manufacture of the Copper Cable Lightning rod at Lincoln, has made a scientific study of electricity through the air and the efficiency of a lightning rod to ward off the evil effect.

His theory is that lightning is not electricity, but the road over which electricity discharges. By coming in contact with the air or other substance the discharge is caused, and without resistance there would be no lightning. He claims that metal of all kinds resist electricity very little therefore becomes a good conductor.

Wood, which offers a great resistance is most often struck and shattered.

He argues that metal does not attract lightning, but is lightning proof. As an instance he asserts that all structures made of metal are lightning proof. Tall buildings in cities covered with metal where their metal pillars extend to the earth. A railroad, train or steam engine is never struck by lightning. It is where there is a lack of lightning

conductors that an explosion and destruction follows. Dwelling houses, barns, school houses, churches, trees and stacks of grain being imperfect conductors frequently suffer. If animals are near they being better conductors are liable to receive the electric current and killed.

Mr. Shinn had a representative of his copper cable in the city last week demonstrating his theory with an X-ray machine, proving that a copper cable, if intelligently adjusted would prove a sure protection from lightning.

He has rodded over 6000 buildings in the past four years with these rods and not one of them has suffered damage. He exhibited us a letter from the National Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of Omaha, which states that they make ten per cent discount on all property they insure that is protected by the C. W. Shinn Copper Cable.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

We the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and to adopt the following articles of Incorporation.

Art. I: The name by which this corporation shall be known is Security State Bank.

Art. II: The principal place of business of this corporation shall be at Broken Bow in the County of Custer and State of Nebraska.

Art. III: The object for which this corporation is formed is to carry on a Commercial banking business under the laws of the state of Nebraska.

Art. IV: The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be \$250,000, which stock shall be divided into shares of the par value of \$100.00 each, of which \$150,000.00 shall be subscribed and fully paid up. No transfer of the stock of this corporation shall be operative until entered upon the books of the corporation.

Art. V: The highest indebtedness of this corporation shall not exceed two thirds of the paid up capital (except deposits).

Art. VI: This corporation shall begin business on the 1st day of June, 1905, and terminate on the 1st day of June, 2005.

Art. VII: The officers of this corporation shall be a President, Vice-President, Cashier, Assistant Cashier, and a Board of Directors, consisting of 5 members, who shall be elected named officers may be a part. The said officers and Board of Directors shall have the management and control of the affairs of this corporation.

Art. VIII: The annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation shall be on the 3rd, Tuesday in Oct. of each year, at which meeting the officers and directors shall be elected by the stockholders of this corporation. The term of office of the officers and directors shall be for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified. A majority of the shares of this corporation shall constitute a quorum at any regular or special meeting.

Art. IX: Each stockholder shall, at all regular or special meetings, be entitled to vote, either in person or by proxy, for each share of stock held.

Art. X: The Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any regular or special meeting called for that purpose, by a two-thirds vote of all the stock of the corporation.
