It took 31 hours on the railroad to go from Fort Barrios to Guatemala, a distance of 101 miles, in which time the train run off the track twice. He says Guatemala is an old town with about 8000 inhabitants, mostly pure Aztec. Paper money there is \$13 for \$1.00 in gold, stamps in the same proportion. It took 13 cents in stamps to send us the letter.
